SC panel holds talks with 12 farmer unions

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court-appointed committee on Friday held consultations with 12 farmer unions and peasants from eight states, including West Bengal, on the controversial farm laws enacted by the Centre recently. This is the seventh meeting held by the panel so far. The three-member committee is holding consultations with stakeholders, both online and in person. In a statement, the committee said it held its interactions through video conference with farmers, farmer unions and farmer producer organisations (FPOs). Twelve farm unions and farmers from Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Jammu and Kashmir, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal participated in the detailed deliberations with the committee members, it said.

Tikait's remark came after Prime Minister Narendra Modi said in the Rajya Sabha that "MSP was there, MSP is there, MSP will remain in the future".

"When did we say that MSP is ending," Tikait asked, according to ANI. "We said that a law be formed on MSP. If such a law is formed, all the farmers of the country will be benefitted. Right now, there is no law on MSP and the farmers are looted by traders." The farmer leader said that the price of crops cannot be decided like the fluctuating cost of air tickets, PTI reported. "There will not be business over hunger in the country," he said. "If hunger goes up, price of crops will be decided accordingly. Those doing business over hunger will be driven out of the

Tikait had earlier warned the farmers' agitation will not conclude unless government repeals the three newly enacted agriculture laws and it may go on till October. On Friday he mentioned that the farmers do a protest every year on October 2 at the Ghazipur border.

"Tear shells and bullets were fired at the farmers on October 2, 2018, at the Ghazipur border. Every year we do a programme here at the Ghazipur border and will also do it this year," he said. Asked about the debates in the Parliament on the farmers' issues, Tikait said it is good that the issue is being raised and debated in the Parliament.AGENCIES

NEW DELHI: The Supreme

Court on Friday upheld the validity of e-voting process for winding up of six mutual fund schemes of Franklin Templeton, and said disbursal of funds to unit holders will continue.

A bench of justices S A Nazeer and Sanjiv Khanna, while rejecting the opposition by some unit holders to the evoting process, said disbursal of funds has to be done as per the earlier order of the apex

The top court had on February 2 ordered that Rs 9,122 crore be disbursed within three weeks to the unit holders of Franklin Templeton's six mutual fund schemes which are proposed to be wound up.

It had said that disbursal of money would be done in proportion to unit holders' interest in the assets.

Earlier, the apex court had asked the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) to appoint an observer for overseeing the e-voting pro-

The e-voting with regard to the winding up Franklin Templeton's six mutual fund schemes had taken place in the last week of December and it has been approved by a majority of unit holders.

The apex court had on February 2 entrusted the State Bank of India (SBI) Mutual port of the observer appointed

Fund to disburse the money as all the lawyers gave consent to the court's order. It had granted liberty to the

litigating parties to approach the court in case of any difficulty in the disbursal of money to unit holders. The top court on January

25 had said it would first deal with the issues related to objection to the e-voting process for winding up of the six mutual fund schemes and distribution of money to the unit holders.

Prior to this, it had granted three days for filing of objections to the e-voting.

The inflation based on Consumer Price Index (CPI) was 4.59 per cent in December 2020. The rate of price rise in the food basket was 1.89 per cent in January, significantly down from 3.41 per cent in December, revealed the data released by the National Statistical Office (NSO). The Reserve Bank, which mainly factors in the retail inflation while arriving at its monetary policy, has been asked to keep CPI inflation at 4 per cent (+,-2 per cent).

Retail inflation for farm and rural workers, meanwhile, eased to 3.25 per cent and 3.34 per cent, respectively, in December, mainly due to lower prices of



tion based on the CPI-AL (Consumer Price Index-Agricultural Labourers and CPI-RL (rural labourers) decreased to 3.25 per cent and 3.34 per cent in December 2020 from 6 per cent and 5.86 per cent respectively in November 2020," a labour ministry statement said.

According to the statement, inflation based on the food index of CPI-AL and CPI-RL is at (+) 2.97 per cent and (+) 2.96 per cent, respectively, in December 2020.

Among states, the maximum decrease in the consumer price index numbers for agricultural labourers and rural workers was experienced by Gujarat and West Bengal (-20 points each) mainly due to the fall in 2020 decreased by 13 and 12 prices of gur, onion, green chillies, vegetables and fruits etc.

On the contrary, the maximum increase in the consumer price index numbers for agricultural labourers and rural workers was experienced by Meghalaya (+2 points and +3 points, respectively) following the rise in prices of pulses, mustard oil, fish dry, vegetables and fruits, firewood, plastic shoes and bus fare etc.

India improves its online civility score



NEW DELHI: Fewer people in India experienced negative online interactions or encountered online risks in 2020 compared to the previous year, even though risk of hate speech grew during the year, according to a report by Microsoft.

Microsoft's annual study 'Civility, Safety, and Interactions Online 2020' along with findings from its 2020 Digital Civility Index (DCI) indicated that India's score in online civility has improved to 68 in 2020 from 71 in 2019. Lower scores indicate more civility

This indicates that fewer people are experiencing negative online interactions or encountering online risks.

it added. "A few risks remain high for India's online users especially hate speech, which has doubled from 2016 to 26 per cent. There has also been a 5 per cent increase in hoaxes, scams, and frauds since 2017 to 22 per cent, and 6 per cent increase in discrimination since 2016 to 16 per cent," it said. Countries with the best DCI score included the UK, the Netherlands, Germany, Malaysia and the US. The countries with the worst scores include Vietnam.

32 geographies. The research polled adults and teenagers about their interactions online and experiences of online risks. Income criteria eased for family pension grant

schemes.

NEW DELHI: The Centre has issued instructions to liberalise the income criteria for eligibility of a deceased government servant or pensioner's family member for pension, Union minister Jitendra Singh said on Monday.

The relaxation is granted for family pension to differentlyabled survivors as they require greater medical care and financial assistance.



"The government is of the view that the income criteria sion, applicable in the case of other family members, may not be applied in the case of a child/sibling suffering from a disability," he said. The government has reviewed and decided that the income criteria for

eligibility for family pension to such children/siblings shall commensurate with the amount of the entitled family pension in their case, the minister of state for personnel.

The Department of Pension and Pensioners' Welfare has issued instructions on Monday for a child/sibling of a deceased government servant/pensioner suffering from a mental or physical disability, according to a Personnel Ministry statement. They shall be eligible for family pension for life if the overall income is less than the entitled family pension at ordinary rate -- 30 per cent -- of the last pay drawn by the deceased government servant/pensioner, plus the dearness relief admissible thereon, the statement said

As per Rule 54(6) of the CCS (Pension) Rules, 1972, a child/ sibling of a deceased government servant or pensioner, who is mentally or physically challenged, is eligible for family pension for life if he or she is suffering a disability that renders him unable to earn his livelihood, it said.

NEW DELHI: Painting a rosy picture of the economy, the finance ministry's monthly report on Tuesday said growth and inflation outlook for 2021-22 portends more than full recovery, and that the country has become the COVID-19 vaccine hub of the world.

With the expanded borrowing programme mostly meant for funding the enhanced capital outlay, the Budget has set in place the multiplier impact on growth to support the prescribed fiscal deficit target of 4.5 per cent of GDP in 2026 under the fiscal glide path.

The report noted that various measures taken by the government since March 2020 against the pandemic ensured minimum loss of life. "Early lockdown, health-

Punjab body polls tomorrow

BESIDES THE RULING CONGRESS IN THE STATE, AAP, SAD AND THE BJP ARE ALSO CONTESTING

CHANDIGARH: The campaigning for the civic body elections scheduled to be held on February 14 in Punjab ended on Friday.

Eight municipal corporations, 109 municipal councils and nagar Panchayats will go to the polls on Sunday with 9,222 candidates in the fray, state Election Commission officials said. The election campaign came to an end at 5 pm. The required election material and EVMs will be handed over to polling parties on February 13 while voting will take place on February 14 from 8 am to 4 pm, the officials said, adding that the counting will take place on February 17.

Besides the ruling Congress in the state, AAP, SAD and the BJP are also contesting these polls. This is the first election in which the SAD and the BJP will be contesting separately after the Akalis snapped ties with the saffron outfit over the farm laws last year.

Ahead of the polls, the Opposition has accused the Congress of "misusing" the government machinery to influence the polls, a charge denied by



the ruling party.

A SAD delegation had on Tuesday urged Punjab Governor V P Singh Badnore to direct the state government to countermand the civic body polls at all places where nomination papers of opposition candidates were rejected.

A BJP delegation on Thursday met the governor, urging him to issue directions for the

deployment of paramilitary forces in the state in the view of "deteriorating" law and order situation ahead of the polls.

A "farmer riding a tractor" remained the most in-demand symbol among independent candidates for the February 14 civic body polls in Punjab, according to officials.

For 19 wards of the Nawan-Some contestants opting shahr municipal committee, at for the symbol said it will help

least seven independent candidates are contesting on the symbol, said an official.

Kuldeep Singh Sidhu, whose wife is contesting as an independent from Ward No. 13 in Mohali's Kharar, said the the symbol of a "farmer driving a tractor" will help them get votes in the elections. He said the symbol represented farmers and farm labourers.

"This symbol was the first choice of each Independent candidate in the wake of the farmers" agitation," said Sidhu, who belongs to a farming

According to officials, in the wards where the number of candidates seeking the symbol was more, draws were taken out. A total of 9,222 candidates are in the fray for the February 14 municipal polls in Punjab. Of them, 2,832 are contesting as independents, 2,037 are from the ruling Congress while 1,569 are Shiromani Akali Dal nominees. The number of candidates from the Bharativa Janata Party and the Aam Aadmi Party are 1,003 and 1,606, respectively. AGENCIES

Farmer, 55, dies by suicide at Tikri **CHHAVI BHATIA**

A pall of gloom descended at Tikri border on Sunday when a 55-year-old farmer died by suicide. Karanveer Singhwal from Narwana, Haryana was found hanging from a tree at the protest site where lakhs of farmers have been holding a peaceful sit-in for almost three months now against the new farm laws. More than 200 farmers participating in the agitation have lost their lives to various causes like hypothermia, heart attack, road accidents and suicide since it started in November.

Singhwal had been camping at the border since November 26 when hundreds of thousands of farmers dug in their heels at various Delhi borders.

A marginal farmer, Singhwal owns only two acres of land. He leaves behind his wife and three daughters, one of whom is married. In his suicide note, the farmer expressed his disappointment with the government's indifference towards their plight and disinterest in repealing the laws.

Dejected at the current state of affairs, the deceased, however, tried to boost his fellow comrades' morale even in his last moment as he urged

"Bharatiya Kisan Union Zindabad. We have no idea how long will this struggle go on before the government revokes these black laws...We will not move from here till these black laws are repealed... Inquilab Zindabad," read the suicide note

The mood remained sombre at Tikri border as farmers held a mourning assembly for Singhwal. Young and old tried to console each other even as they struggled to hold back their emotions. In few poignant moments, youths held hands of their elderly, encouraging them that the fight is not theirs alone.

"It is extremely painful to have lost someone who was fighting for his right. The government should understand them to give a spirited fight and not leave till the laws are ur future. Why is it behaving

so inhumanly," asked Rajinder Malik, a farmer from Bhiwani. Grieving the loss of a fellow 'warrior', the farmers also pledged that they will honour his last wish.

"So many of them who have either taken their lives or died otherwise had only one wishto take this movement to its logical end. We will not go back till the laws are scrapped. These sacrifices won't go in vain," Dharampal, another farmer from Tohana said.

Doctors camping at Tikri and Singhu border have expressed their concern about the mental health of farmers who have been protesting, saying they are in a sensitive emotional and mental state. They have attributed it to high stress levels, insecurity of future and fear of their movement going on endlesslv

Behind the smiling and chardi kalan faces we see at the protest site lies a soul that is grappling to make sense of everything. He is constantly dreading losing his land, this battle. It is just not easy being here and fighting without getting affected," says Dr Swaiman Singh. "We try to cheer them up whenever they come to us for treatment or when we go meet them. Their spirits must be kept high. So we encourage them to talk," he

Plywood industry sinking in Haryana

Development is fine, but not at the cost of lives

he staggering collapse of part of a glacier in Uttarakhand's Nanda Devi mountain and the ensuing floods that have claimed many lives come as a deadly reminder that this fragile, geologically dynamic region can never be taken for granted. A significant slice of the glacier, dislodged by a landslide, according to some satellite images, produced roaring torrents in the Rishiganga and Dhauliganga rivers in Chamoli district, trapping unsuspecting workers at two hydro power project sites. Scores of people are still missing in the wave of water, silt and debris that swamped the rivers and filled tunnels in the Tapovan power project, although the immediate rescue of nearly 15 people by the ITBP, the Army and other agencies brings some cheer. The rescuers face a challenging environment as they try to locate more survivors and bring relief supplies to paralysed communities. These immediate measures are important, along with speedy compensation to affected families. But the Centre and the Uttarakhand government cannot ignore the larger context of the State's increasing frailty in the face of environmental shocks. Once the crucible of environmentalism, epitomised by Sunderlal Bahuguna, Gaura Devi and the Chipko movement, the State's deep gorges and canyons have attracted many hydroelectric projects and dams, with little concern for quake risk. Red flags have been raised repeatedly, particularly after the 1991 quake in the region where the Tehri dam was built and the 2013 floods that devastated Kedarnath, pointing to the threat from seismicity, dam-induced microseismicity, landslides and floods from a variety of causes, including unstable glacial lakes and climate change. India has heavily invested in dam development and growth of hydropower, mainly in the Himalaya region. But environmental implications of these projects should not be overlooked.



ALL ASPECTS MUST BE LOOKED INTO

The inexorable growth of OTT channels has infused creative talent into film-making, aided by absence of overbearing censors and vested interests. This development has both positive and negative aspects.

Taking the long view with China

n late January, External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar said that while both India and China remained committed to a multipolar world, they should recognise that a "multipolar Asia" was one of its essential constituents. As it moves to becoming the third largest economy in the world, India needs to have a clear-eyed world view and strategy as it makes hard choices. It needs to reject the developing country regional mindset that has

hobbled national aims and foreign policy.

The Year End Review of the Ministry of Defence pertinently refers to the "sanctity of our claims in Eastern Ladakh" instead of the term "border" used since 1954, opening space for a settlement. We are now confidently moving out of the predicament that Jawaharlal Nehru placed us in Kashmir, fully integrating it into the Indian Union and consolidating our claim line.

The External Affairs Ministry is also now more forthright. We have a "special and privileged strategic partnership' with Russia, which provides more than three-quarter of India's military equipment, and a "comprehensive global strategic partnership" with the U.S. despite the United States Strategic Framework for the Indo-Pacific, 2018, wishing that India sees the U.S. as its preferred partner on security issues. India's relationship with the U.S.-led Quadrilateral Security Dialogue (Quad), where the others are military allies, has rightly been cautious, as U.S. President Joe Biden sees China as a 'strategic competitor' rather than a 'strategic rival'. Realism dictates that India does not need to compromise on its strategic autonomy.img

The foreign policy challenge for India is really two sides of the China conundrum: defining engagement with its neighbour which is consolidating an expanding Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) while remaining involved with the strategic, security and technological concerns of the U.S. located across the vast Pacific Ocean. The U.S. 'Annual Report to Congress: Military and Security Developments involving the People's Republic of China' cautions that U.S. aircraft carriers, symbols of the country's military hegemony, may not enjoy unquestioned dominance for much longer. Former President Barack Obama's military pivot to Asia failed to overawe China in the South China Sea and the costs of former President Donald Trump's trade tariffs were borne by American consumers and companies.

In the financial sphere, there is the real possibility of the Chinese renminbi becoming a global reserve currency or e-yuan becoming the digital payments currency. China is the world's largest trading economy. It could soon become the world's largest economy — the Fortune Global 500 list of the world's largest companies by revenue for the first



time contains more companies based in China, including Hong Kong, than in the U.S. The BRI countries are using the renminbi in financial transactions with China, and can be expected to use it in transactions with each other. Even the European Union, smarting under Mr. Trump's sanctions, created its own cross-border clearing mechanism for trade. China has stitched together an investment agreement with the EU and with most of Asia. Relative attractiveness will determine when the dollar goes the way of the sterling and the guilder. China, facing technological sanctions from the U.S., may well put in the hard work to make this happen soon.

Some form of the EU's China policy of seeing the emerging superpower as a partner, competitor, and economic rival depending on the policy area in question is going to be the global norm. The EU's reaching out to China despite misgivings of the U.S. means the West has given up on containing the rise of China. This broad perspective is also reflected in India's participation in both the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation, led by Beijing and Moscow and designed to resist the spread of Western interests, and in the U.S.-led Quad, with its anti-China stance. Within the United Nations, India's interests have greater congruence with China's interests rather than the U.S.'s and the EU's; sharing the COVID-19 vaccine with other countries distinguishes India, and China, from the rest.

The congruence between India and the U.S. lies in the U.S.'s declared strategic objective of promoting an integrated economic development model in the Indo-Pacific as a credible alternative to the BRI, but with a caveat. China opening new opportunities for countries in the Eurasian landmass means that ASEAN will not easily move out of the BRI infrastructure, digital, finance and trade linkages; Sri Lanka is a recent example. The China-led Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank has increased its membership to 100 countries. China is now the second-biggest financial contributor to the UN and has published more high-impact research papers than the U.S. did in 23 out of 30 "hot" research fields and enhancing its 'soft power' nearly to levels achieved by the U.S. earlier.

Instead of an alternate development model, India should move the Quad towards supplementing the infrastructure push of the BRI in line with other strategic concerns in the region. For example, developing their scientific, technological capacity and digital economy, based on India's digital stack and financial resources of other Quad members, will resonate with Asia and Africa.

Another area where India can play a 'bridging role' is global governance whose principles, institutions and structures now have to accommodate other views for issue-based understandings. President Xi Jinping's "community with shared future for mankind", and Prime Minister Narendra Modi's "climate justice" and asking how long India will be excluded from the UN Security Council, challenge the frame of the liberal order without providing specific alternatives. With respect to digital data, the defining issue of the 21st century, India has recently expressed that there must be reciprocity in data sharing, and this is the kind of 'big idea' for sharing prosperity that will gain traction with other countries

India's recent policies are gaining influence at the expense of China and the West, and both know this trend will accelerate. The steps to a \$5 trillion economy, shift to indigenous capital military equipment, and a new Science, Technology and Innovation Policy underline impact, capacity and interests. ASEAN remains keen India re-join its trade pact to balance China. It is being recognised that India's software development prowess could shape a sustainable post-industrial state different to the U.S. and China model. As in the historical past, Asia is big enough for both Asian giants to have complementary roles, share prosperity and be independent of each other and of the West.

Moving towards sustainable growth

e COVID-19 pandemic has taught us many lessons. It made us realise that we are a part of nature and emphasised the urgent need to protect the ecological functions of the biosphere we live in. It has unequivocally highlighted how vital the health of the planet is for our individual and collective well-being as well as the growth of our economies.

The pandemic has resulted in huge economic losses. Globally, the GDP is expected to contract 2.4% to 8% in 2020. The World Economic Forum (WEF) estimates that the global cost of dealing with the pandemic could be from trillion to \$15.8 trillion. Preventing such pandemics will cost only a fraction of this amount, estimated at \$22.2 billion to \$30.7 billion a year, and this is without factoring in the human suffering.

We have to recognise that there would not be an economy without the natural environment. Global studies documenting human ecological footprint, the decline in wildlife populations, and the conversion rates of natural ecosystems for other uses, place India among countries experiencing the highest rates of negative change. This increases our vulnerability towards catastrophes, including pandemics. Additionally, there is a strong correlation between human density, richness of biodiversity, and the emergence of zoonotic pathogens of wild origin, which renders India particularly vulnerable. With high human densities -



among the highest diversity of mammals in the world — and a saturated interface between humans and wildlife, India is considered to be among the hotspots for zoonotic emerging and re-emerging infectious diseases.img

The WEF's Global Risks report for 2021 states that environmental risks continue to threaten the global economy. The top five risks are extreme weather, climate action failure, human environmental damage, infectious diseases and biodiversity loss. In terms of impact, infectious diseases top the list, followed by climate action failure. The top two risk response blind spots are climate action failure and biodiversity loss.

Our models of development and our notions about them have to change. Destruction of environment should no

longer be justified in the name of development. Like all pandemics, COVID-19's emergence has been entirely driven by unchecked activities in the name of development. Rampant destruction of natural habitats, especially due to mining and infrastructure development, continued expansion and intensification of agriculture and animal husbandry as well as unrestrained consumption have disrupted nature, increased contact between wildlife, livestock, pathogens and people, setting the stage for the pandemic to take hold of our lives. Pandemic risk can be significantly lowered by reducing biodiversity as it will help prevent the spillover of new diseases

A study by Swiss Re Institute published in 2020 introduces a new biodiversity and ecosystem services index. It found that globally, 20% of countries, including India, have fragile ecosystems. It also states that 55% of the global GDP depends on high-functioning biodiversity and ecosystem services.

It is evident that policymakers should factor biodiversity and ecosystems into their economic decision-making. This will accelerate the transition from a fossil fuel-based economy to sustainable, equitable, inclusive and just development models. The Economics of Biodiversity: The Dasgupta Review, commissioned by HM Treasury and released on February 2, 2021, highlights the grave risks faced by the world because of the failure of

degradation of nature. The review stresses the need to find new measures for growth and development to avoid a catastrophic breakdown. The world's governments need to come up with a form of national accounting that is different from the GDP model, and the new system has to account for the depletion of nature and natural resources

The evidence is overwhelming. All budgets need to reduce investments, including subsidies, in activities that will further degrade our natural habitats. By orders of magnitude, we should enhance science

A National Mission on Biodiversity and Human Well-Being has been approved by the Prime Minister's Science Technology and Innovation Advisory Council. The overarching objectives are to restore and enhance biodiversity, strengthen its sustainable use, generate thousands of green jobs and encourage the Indian public to appreciate the natural and associated cultural treasures that we have collectively inherited. This initiative has the potential to enable India to play a global leadership role in linking conservation with tangible human wellbeing outcomes.

Bhatia camp had rejected the allegations. Based on the complaints, SEBI examined the issues and based on its investigation, a show cause notice was issued with respect to InterGlobe Aviation on 10 November, 2020.AGENCIES

24 LIFE INSURANCE COMPANIES POST PROFIT WORTH RS 7,728.30 CRORE IN 2019-20

NEW DELHI: The life insurance industry registered a decline of 8.4 per cent in net profit at Rs 7,728.30 crore in 2019-20, Irdai's annual report showed on Wednesday.

The 24 life insurance companies had posted profit after tax of Rs 8,435.81 crore in 2018-19.

"During the financial year 2019-20, the life insurance industry reported a profit after tax of Rs 7,728 crore as against Rs 8,436 crore in 2018-19. Out of the 24 life insurers in operation during the year, 17 companies reported profits,' said the Insurance Regulatory and Development Authority of India (Irdai) Annual Report 2019-20.

The country's largest and only state-owned life insurer LIC registered a modest increase of 0.9 per cent in net profit at Rs 2,712.71 crore during the year as against Rs 2,688.50 crore in the preceding fiscal.

The remaining 23 private sector players registered a decline of 12.7 per cent in their collective net profit at Rs 5,015.59 crore as against Rs 5,747.31 crore in FY19.

Irdai said the investment income (excluding dividend distribution tax) of all the life

Health insurance eyes higher double-digits growth

During FY15-FY20, the segment expanded by a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of 20 per cent.

"We expect the sector to grow at higher double digits in the medium term, with private players growing even faster as they have been gaining market share over public sector firms and also because of the increase in premium prices due to medical inflation," India Ratings and Re-

search said in a report. The agency said it is essential for insurers to maintain

adequate buffers over the regulatory minimum so as to be prepared for any unforeseen risk events. With the increasing stan-

dardisation of policies with an incremental reduction in exclusion, there could be upward pressure on premium pricing, it said

Also, the COVID-19 outbreak has led to an increase in claim severity across insurers. as the lack of standard rates between hospitals has led to igher outflows, it said.

While COVID-19-like scenarios would be rare events, it would increase the premium pricing for the entire populace, with extra care needed for the treatment of infectious diseases," the report said.

BUDGET 2021 SLAMMED

OPPOSITION LEADERS IN RS TERM THE BUDGET AS ONE 'FOR THE RICH AND BY THE RICH'

NEW DELHI: Opposition parties in the Rajya Sabha on Thursday termed the union budget for 2021-22 as one "for the rich and by the rich" that reflected a "painful story" of the country and bankruptcy of its economy.

Various parties including the Congress, TMC, SP and left parties hit out at the government over the state of the economy and rising unemployment and alleged that the Modi dispensation was out to sell the country"s assets.

Participating in the debate on the union budget, Congress leader P Chidambaram tore into the government for presenting a "disappointing" budget and described it as a "budget for the rich, of the rich and by the rich" meant for only "one per cent of India"s population controlling 73 per cent wealth".

Rejecting the budget, the former finance minister hit out at the ruling dispensation, charging it with "incompetent economic management".

Participating in a debate on the budget, he said, "The sub-text is, this is a budget for the rich, of the rich and by the rich.... There is nothing for the poor people of India, who continue to suffer.... This is a budget for those one per cent who control 73 per cent of India"s wealth

He said the government is in denial about the slowdown in the economy and believed that the problem in the economy is cyclical and not structural.

FY22 real GDP to grow at 10.4%

MUMBAI: India's real GDP will grow at 10.4 per cent in FY22, after a 7.8 per cent contraction in the pandemic-impacted FY21, India Ratings and Research said on Wednesday.

The domestic ratings agency, however, made it clear that the higher growth in FY22 will be due to the low base and from a trend growth perspective, India will still be at a lower level at the end of the next fiscal.

"This fiscal year (FY21) is giving us the worst growth in independent India, next fiscal will be the best because of the base effect because we have slowed down so much this year," its Chief Economist Devendra Pant told reporters on a call.

The agency has a "cautiously optimistic" view on the Indian economy at present, he said, welcoming a slew of Budget measures including the transparency and credible assumptions it makes.

However, consumption, which has been the mainstay of growth for many years, has been lagging. After consecutive years of slowing growth and now a contraction, the rational consumer has decided to cut down on expenses, he said.

Economic growth potential has slipped to not more than 5 to 6 per cent as against the 7.5 to 8 per cent levels it was pegged at before the beginning of the growth slowdown in FY17, the agency's



Principal Economist Sunil Kumar Sinha said.

He said the 15th Finance Commission also assumes a similar growth trajectory in the medium term and warned that pump-priming the economy to achieve more than potential will lead to inflationary pressures.

Sinha further said the economy will be merely covering the lost ground of FY21 in the next fiscal, and if looked at from a longer term lens, it will be only a marginal recovery.

The agency expects headline retail inflation to cool down to 4.3 per cent in FY22, which is still above the RBI's mid-term target of 4 per cent, and hence expects a longish pause for 6-9 months more from the central bank, he said.

Sinha said from a consumption growth perspective, the recently announced Budget indeed has some measures but rued that it ignores the bottom of the pyramid, as there are no specific measures towards that base.

has been a cut in the spends towards rural employment guarantee as well, which can e seen as being indicative of the government's confidence in the recovery wherein it feels that economic growth in itself will lead to a betterment of conditions for the target population.

Pant added that the government has conceded to taking a relook at the MN-REGA spends if the conditions so arise during the course of the year.

Disclosure format created under insider trading rules

NEW DELHI: Capital markets watchdog Sebi on Tuesday came out with a new format for disclosures to be made under the insider trading norms.

In light of amendments to the PIT Regulations affecting the inclusion of members of the promoter group, and designated person in place of employee and on the basis of feedback received from market participants and exchanges, the relevant disclosure formats have been suitably revised, Sebi said in a circular.

Under the new format, details of securities held upon becoming a member of the



company and immediate relatives of such persons need to be disclosed, besides, any change in shareholding also needs to be disclosed.

In September, the Securities and Exchange Board promoter group of a listed of India (Sebi) had decided

to implement system-driven disclosures for members of the promoter group, directors and designated persons of a listed company.

The system-driven disclosures in the securities market were first introduced in December 2015 and are being implemented in a phased manner.

"It has now been decided to implement the system-driven disclosures for member(s) of promoter group and designated person(s) in addition to the promoter(s) and director(s) of the company...under the PIT Regulations," Sebi had said **AGENCIES**



variant first found in the British region of Kent is a concern because it is mutating and so could undermine the protection given by vaccines against developing COVID-19, the head of the UK's genetic surveillance programme said.

The coronavirus has killed 2.35 million people and turned normal life upside down for billions, but a few new worrying variants out of thousands have raised fears that vaccines will may require booster shots.img

V2 or B.1.351; the British variant known as 20I/501Y.V1or B.1.1.7: and the Brazilian variant known as P.1. The British variant, which is more infectious but not necessarily more deadly than others, was likely "to sweep theworld", Peacock said.

"Once we get on top of (the virus) or it mutates itself out of being virulent - causing disease then we can stop worrying about it. But I think, looking in the future, we're going to be doing this for years. We're still going to be doing this 10 years down the line, in my view."AGENCIES
