Their tractor trolleys full of ration supplies, beds, fans, utensils, gas cylinders and themselves armed with patience, farmers from Punjab descended on the city Tuesday to protest against AAP government in scenes reminiscent of the Kisan Morcha of 2020. SRINAGAR: Hurriyat Conference headed by Mirwaiz Umar Farooq on Wednesday called for a bandh in Kashmir to pay tributes to Moulvi Mohammad Farooq and Abdul Gani Lone on their death anniversary on May 21. The separatist amalgam asked people to visit Eidgah, where the two leaders have been laid to rest, and offer prayers for them.

Abdul Gani Lone, a prominent Hurriyat leader, was assassinated in 2002 during a rally to mark the death anniversary of former Mirwaiz of Kashmir Moulvi Mohammad Farooq in Srinagar. Moulvi Farooq, the father of Hurriyat leader Mirwaiz Umar Farooq, was assassinated in 1990.

The Hurriyat Conference also condemned the continued

AAP yes to 12 demands, farmers go back in 2 days

The protesters had also demanded that the arrest warrants issued against farmers who have taken loans from co-operative societies should be cancelled and the loans up to Rs 2 lakh be waived off. "This is just the beginning. More farmers will join us tomorrow and we won't go back till the governments meets our demands. We won't give up," farmer leader Jagjit Singh Dallewal had said Tuesday, warning the AAP government that they will break barricades and moves towards Chandigarh on Wednesday in absence of any redressal.

On Wednesday, CM Mann held a meeting with leaders of protesting farmers' unions in which 12 of the 13 demands

were agreed upon. They, however, couldn't reach any consensus on Rs 500 bonus on each quintal of wheat due to less yield following unrelenting heat this season that has led to shrivelling of grains. As decided in the meeting, the state will be divided into two zones to sow paddy, a departure from its earlier order in which it had said sowing would start from June 18 in a staggered manner in the four zones. Half of the state would now be able to sow paddy from June 14 and the second zone would be able to do so from June 17.

Mann also assured the farmers that they would be getting MSP on moong at Rs 7,275 per quintal.

BJP works to create divide, Cong to connect with all: Rahul

Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Monday accused the BJP and Prime Minister Narendra Modi of trying to create two Hindustans, one for the rich and the other for the poor.

Addressing a rally here, he also lashed out at Prime Minister Narendra Modi over the state of the economy, accusing him of destroying the economy which was "strengthened" by the former UPA government. The Congress, he said, works to connect with all while the BJP works to create a divide. The BJP and Modi want to create two Hindustans, one for the rich and select two-three industrialists, and the other of Dalits, farmers, the poor and underprivileged while the Congress wants only one Hindustan, he said, adding, "This is the fight in the country."

The Congress leader said there is a fight between two ideologies in the country. The Congress says that we have to move forward while connecting with all, respect and protect the culture of all. The BJP works to divide, 'crush' and



'suppress'. (BJP) works to remove history and culture of tribals, he said in the tribal dominated area of southern Rajasthan. We work to connect while they work to divide. We help the weaker and they help selected top industrialists, he said. The Congress leader, who has been targeting the government over the state of the economy and issue of unemployment, said, "The BJP government has attacked our economy. PM did demonetisation, wrongly implemented GST due to which the economy got destroyed. UPA worked to strengthen the economy but Narendra Modi caused harm to our economy".

CBI raids wrong, party stands behind Chidambaram: Congress

Congress today put its weight behind party leader P Chidambaram, saying the CBI raids against him and his son in connection with an 11-year-old case are "wrong" and aimed at diverting attention from the key issues of inflation and unemployment.

The party also said P Chidambaram is a nationalist and patriot whose commitment to the country is beyond question.

The CBI registered a fresh case against Lok Sabha MP Karti Chidambaram to probe the allegation of facilitating visas of 250 Chinese nationals in lieu of Rs 50 lakh when his father P Chidambaram was Union home minister. The agency also conducted coordinated searches at 10 locations in multiple cities including the Chidambarams' residences in Chennai and Delhi.

Senior Congress spokesper-



son Ajay Maken told reporters at a press conference here that the "raids were wrong". "The Congress party stands behind P Chidambaram. This is being done to divert the attention of people from the issue of rising inflation and unemployment," he told reporters. "The issue is being raised 12 years later and Chidambaram has also raised questions on the timings of the raids," Maken said.

Congress chief spokesperson Randeep Surjewala said, "Mr P Chidambaram is a na-

tionalist and a patriot, whose commitment to the country is unquestionable. "To plant source-based preposterous allegations against a former Home Minister and Finance Minister by CBI reflects the lowest ebb in political discourse," Surjewala said on Twitter.

Chidambaram has also raised questions over the timing of the raids which were conducted on charges dating back 11 years. He said a CBI team searched his residence in Chennai as well as his official residence in Delhi but "found nothing and seized nothing". "The team showed me an FIR in which I am not named as an accused. The search team found nothing and seized nothing," he said.

"I may point out that the timing of the search is interesting," he added.

Senior Akali leader Tota Singh passes away

Senior Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) leader and former Punjab minister Tota Singh, 81, passed away at a private hospital in Mohali on Saturday after prolonged illness.

Singh had served as the agriculture and education minister in the Akali government. He was the senior vice-president and a member of the core committee of the SAD. He was also a member of the Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee. Singh was elected as legislator for the first time from the Moga Assembly seat in 1997. He was inducted as education minister in the Parkash Singh Badal-led government at that time.

No decision yet on joining BJP or AAP: Hardik Patel



AHMEDABAD: A day after resigning from the Congress, Patidar leader Hardik Patel on Thursday said he has not taken any decision yet on joining any other party, be it the ruling BJP in Gujarat or the new entrant AAP.

Addressing a press conference here, Patel (28) claimed the Congress had no vision and that leaders of the party were biased against Gujarati people.

Ahead of the Gujarat Assembly polls due later this year, Patel on Wednesday resigned from the Congress, claiming top leaders of the party were distracted by their mobile phones and that Gujarat Congress leaders were more interested in arranging chicken sandwiches for them.

Asked if he would join the BJP or the Arvind Kejriwal-led Aam Aadmi Party, Patel on Thursday said, "I have not taken any decision as of now on joining any political party, be it the BJP or AAP."

Hitting out at the Congress, he said the party never speaks anything on the issues concerning Hindus, such as the CAA (Citizenship Amendment Act) or on the issue of a 'Shivling' (said to be) found in a mosque in Varanasi.

"Moreover, the Gujarat Congress is too much into caste-based politics. I wasted my three years in this party," Patel said.

Cong tried to suppress my nationalist voice, says Jakhar after joining BJP

Former president of the Punjab Congress, Sunil Jakhar, who joined the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) on Thursday, said that an attempt was being made to suppress his nationalist voice in the grand old party.

BJP's national president JP Nadda inducted Sunil Jakhar into the party at the national headquarters in New Delhi.

Talking to the media after joining the BJP, Jakhar said that it was not easy to break 50 years of relationship with the Congress, from 1972 to 2022, my three generations worked considering the Congress as their family.

"Stood with the party in every good and bad time. But an attempt was made to suppress my nationalist voice in the Congress. I was given a notice to speak in the interest



of Punjab and the country," he said.

Pakistani woman, separated during Partition, reunites with Indian siblings after 75 years

Seventy-five years after she was separated from her family during the violence at the time of the Partition, a woman born in a Sikh family who was adopted and raised by a Muslim couple met her brothers from India at Kartarpur in Pakistan's Punjab province, according to a media report on Wednesday. At the time of the Partition, Mumtaz Bibi, who was born in a Sikh family, was an infant who was lying on the dead body of her mother killed by a violent mob, the Dawn newspaper reported.

A couple named Muhammad Iqbal and Allah Rakhi adopted the baby girl and raised her as their own daughter, naming her Mumtaz Bibi. After the Partition, Iqbal settled at Varika Tian vil-



lage in Sheikhpura district of Pakistan's Punjab province.

Iqbal and his wife did not tell Mumtaz that she was not their daughter. Two years ago, Iqbal's health suddenly deteriorated and he told Mumtaz that she was not his real daughter and she belonged to a Sikh family.



After Iqbal's death, Mumtaz and her son Shahbaz started searching for her family through social media. They knew the name of Mumtaz's real father and the village (Sidrana) in Patiala district of Punjab (India) where they settled after being forced to leave their native home.

Mumtaz Bibi, born a Sikh and adopted by Muslim couple, searched for her family through social media

Both the families got connected through social media. Subsequently, Mumtaz's brothers Gurmeet Singh, Narendra Singh and Amrinder Singh, accompanied by other family members, reached Gurdwara Darbar Sahib at Kartarpur.

The Kartarpur corridor links Gurdwara Darbar Sahib in Pakistan, the final resting place of Sikhism founder Guru Nanak Dev, with the Dera Baba Nanak shrine in Gurdaspur district in India's Punjab state.

SC orders release of Rajiv Gandhi assassination case convict A G Perarivalan

Invoking its extraordinary power under Article 142 of the Constitution, the Supreme Court Wednesday ordered the release of A G Perarivalan, who has served over 30 years in jail in the Rajiv Gandhi assassination case.

A bench headed by Justice L Nageswara Rao said the Tamil Nadu state cabinet's advice recommending the premature release of all seven convicts in the case was binding on the governor. The apex court also discarded the Centre's argument that the president exclusively has the power to grant pardon in a case under section 302 the Indian Penal Code, saying this would render article 161 (power of governor to grant pardon) functionless.

The bench, also comprising Justice B R Gavai, held that states have the power to advise and aid the governor in case of



pleas of pardon under article 161 made by convicts in murder cases. Article 142 of the Constitution deals with the Supreme Court's power to exercise its jurisdiction and pass order for doing complete justice in any cause or matter pending before it. The article was also used in the Ram Janmabhoomi-Babri Masjid land dispute case.

The Centre had earlier defended the Tamil Nadu governor's decision to send the mercy plea of Perarivalan to the president. Additional Solicitor General K M Nataraj had said that only the president can decide the plea regarding remission, commutation and mercy plea of an individual convicted under the central law.

Punjab enhances rates of cash in lieu of land and cash award to distinguished services award

CHANDIGARH: In recognition with the gallantry services of defence services personnel, the Punjab Cabinet led by Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann on Wednesday approved enhancement by 40% in rates of Cash in lieu of land and Cash award to Distinguished Services Award Winners, which would lead to greater satisfaction to these awardees and motivate others for selfless service towards nation in future.



Consequently, rates of cash in lieu of land has been enhanced for Sarvotam Yudh Seva Medal winners from Rs.2 lakh to Rs.2.80 lakh, Uttam Yudh Seva Medal winners from Rs.1 lakh to Rs.1.40 lakh, Yudh Seva Medal winners from Rs. 50,000/- to Rs.70,000/-, Sena/Nao Sena/Vayu Sena Medal (D) winners

Likewise, the rates of Cash award have also been enhanced for Sarvotam Yudh Seva Medal winners from Rs.25,000/- to Rs.35,000/-, Uttam Yudh Seva Medal winners from Rs.15,000/- to Rs.21,000/-, Yudh Seva Medal winners from Rs.10,000/- to Rs.14,000/-, Sena/Nao Sena/Vayu Sena Medal (D) winners from Rs.8,000/- to Rs.11,200/-, Mention-in-Dispatches (D) winners from Rs.7,000/- to Rs.9,800/-, Param Vishisht Seva Medal winners from Rs.20,000/- to Rs.28,000/-, Ati Vishisht Seva Medal winners from Rs.10,000/- to Rs.14,000/- and Vishisht Seva Medal winners from Rs.5,000/- to Rs.7,000/-. It may be recalled that these rates have not been enhanced since 2011.

Punjab Cabinet Rs. 1500 per acre incentive to the farmers for adopting DSR technology

CHANDIGARH: In a major step aimed at conserving scarce natural resources like underground water through Direct Seeding of Rice (DSR) technology, the Punjab Cabinet led by Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann on Wednesday approved Rs. 1500 per acre incentive to the farmers for sowing of paddy through this innovative technology. A sum of Rs.450 crore has been earmarked to provide incentive to the farmers for promotion of less water consuming and cost effective DSR technology. This step would be instrumental to save nearly about 15-20 percent water as compared to the conventional puddling (kaddu)



method during the life cycle of crops. Pertinently, the alarming situation arisen out of fast depleting ground water mainly due to water guzzling traditional method of paddy transplantation needs bold measures to check this serious trend instantly. Currently the water table is falling at rate of 86 cm per year leading to a precarious situation, where no underground water will be available across the state in coming 15-20 years.

All genuine grievances of dairy farmers will be resolved soon, assures Kuldeep Dhaliwal to dairy farmers

SAS NAGAR: Punjab Minister for Animal Husbandry, Fisheries and Dairy Development Kuldeep Singh Dhaliwal today held a meeting with progressive dairy farmers and fish farmers at livestock complex here. In this meeting, they discussed the problems being faced by dairy farmers and fish farmers. Speaking on the occasion, the Cabinet Minister said that the Government is committed to diversify agriculture, for which a massive campaign will be launched across the state to promote the allied occupations of agriculture, dairy farming and fisheries, and animal husbandry in a big way and to make the state a leader in this field. The minister also appealed to the youth to opt for these allied farming practices and said that the government will extend maximum help to those who are willing to adopt these practices.



Earlier, Daljit Singh, president of the PDFA Committee, dairy farmers have also taken up suggestions for setting up a stabilization fund for milk prices, besides increasing the rates of milk, providing cheap feed, etc. It also demanded a stringent law to crack down on adulterated milk trade by existing dairy farmers. Minister Dhaliwal said that still half of the villages in the state are not connected with Verka and their main aim is to further strengthen the cooperative movement in the state by connecting people with the dairy farming business in all the villages. The Minister further said that it has only been two months since the government was formed, so all the dairy farmers should cooperate with the government and all their legitimate demands will be addressed. During a meeting with the fish farmers the Minister gave directions to the officials of the Fisheries Department, the Minister said that one lakh acres of salinity affected land should be brought under the control of fish farming by linking the youth with fish and prawn farming. Agreeing with another view, Kuldeep Dhaliwal said that in order to reduce the cost of electricity for fish and shrimp farming, a proposal should be prepared and submitted for providing subsidized installation of solar pumps. Regarding the solution

of the problem of fish theft in the fish ponds, the Minister directed the department to prepare a proposal for the provision of CCTV facilities at the ponds. Apart from this the Minister also directed to look into the possibility of providing insurance facilities to fish and shrimp farmers to the farmers. Prominent present in the meeting included Vikas Pratap, Principal Secretary Animal Husbandry, Fisheries and Dairy Development Department, Kamildeep Singh Sangha Managing Director, Milkfed, Dr. Subhash Chandra, Director, Department of Animal Husbandry, Kuldeep Singh Jassowal, Director, Department of Dairy Development, Interjit Singh, Vice Chancellor, GADWASU, Sukhwinder Singh Walla, Assistant Director Fisheries and Dairy Development Department besides other officials of the department were also present.

Political leaders start lobbying for 2 Rajya Sabha seats in Haryana

With the announcement of filling up 57 Rajya Sabha seats in Lok Sabha on June 10, 2022, which include two seats for Haryana state to be vacant due to completion of tenure of BJP supported Rajya Sabha members Dushyant Gautam and independent Rajya Sabha member Subhash Chandra large number of heavy weight political leaders in the state has already started lobbying for these seats. According to information, there is likely one each of these seats will be occupied by BJP-JJP alliance ruling candidate and other by Congress candidate. Political rumours reveal, Deputy Chief Minister Dushyant Chautala is willing to have this seat in favour of his party president Ajay Chautala his father or his brother Digvijay Chautala. The present scenario reveals, there are 40 BJP, 31 Congress, 10 JJP, 7 independent, one each INLD and HALOP MLAs in Haryana Vidhan Sabha. Information reveals that large number of BJP as well as Congress political leaders including few former ministers and MLAs are in the race to occupy Rajya Sabha seat to be vacated by Subhash Chandra occupied by him in June 2016 with BJP support, whereas the second Rajya Sabha seat was in favour of former BJP minister Ch. Virender Singh later submitted resignation during 2019 Lok Sabha

polls for the sake of his son Brijinder Singh won polls. Dushyant Gautam a 'Dalit' leader from Delhi won Rajya Sabha seat in March 2020 on behalf of BJP. Both Retired Lt. Gen. Dr D.P. Vats from BJP and Deepender Hooda from Congress will hold their chairs till April 2024 whereas Ram Chander Jagra from BJP will continue as Rajya Sabha member till April 10, 2026. Information reveals, Kumari Shelja a former Rajya Sabha member recently removed from the chair of Congress President in the state being near and dear to Sonia Gandhi is likely to be adjusted as Rajya Sabha member again by Congress high command. Sources reveal, there is a long list of senior BJP leaders including few former ministers attempting to occupy Rajya Sabha seat and the names of few of them include former BJP state president Om Parkash Dhankad, former BJP state president Subhash Barala, former industry minister Vipul Goel, former education minister Ram Bilas Sharma, former finance minister Capt Abhimanyu, former urban development minister Kavita Jain, 'Dalit' leader Krishan Panwar also a former minister, former MLA Bhagwan Das Kabirpanthi, former BJP convener Sudesh Kataria, Meenu Beniwal and Subhash Chandra wanting to retain this seat again.

Centre to give Punjab 10 more CAPF companies: Mann after meeting Shah

Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann on Thursday said that the Centre will be providing 10 additional companies of Central Armed Police Forces to Punjab. Talking to the media after meeting Union Home Minister Amit Shah here in North Block, he said that he discussed several matters including issues of na-

tional security and technology infrastructure to enhance border management services. "We requested anti-drone technology. He (Amit Shah) said that we will work together in regard to national security while the issues related to the farmers' demand for bonus on wheat crop and price issues related to the Basmati crop

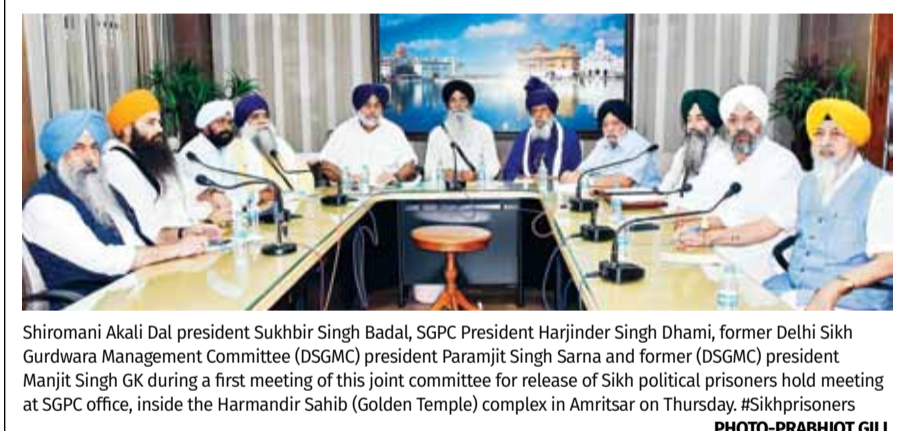

We have electricity and water connection, besides other government identification documents on these addressees. «But now, the ruling Aam Aadmi Party government is asking us to immediately vacate the

land. This is not justified as the children have to attend the local school. We can't vacate the land and shift our elderly people, especially those who are unwell. We request the NCSC to please help us and protect our land, « the villagers rued. However, invoking relevant clause Section (7) of the rules of procedures of the commission, the NCSC asked the state Chief Secretary, the Director General of Police, the Deputy Commissioner of Ludhiana and the SSP to maintain the status quo until the matter is pending.

Gehlot dials Punjab CM for quick repair of Sirhind canal



JAIPUR: Rajasthan Chief minister Ashok Gehlot on Friday spoke to his Punjab counterpart Bhagwant Mann over the phone, requesting him to get the repair of the damaged portion of the Sirhind canal done. 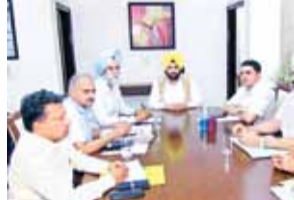

GYANVAPI SURVEY

Report submitted to Varanasi court

A commission appointed by a court here to conduct a survey of the Gyanvapi Mosque-Shringar Gauri complex filed its report on Thursday, submitting documents, videos and photographs. Special Advocate Commissioner Vishal Singh said he has submitted the report on the survey conducted on May 14, 15 and 16. "I do not have the right to tell what is in the survey report. Now the court will take further action on it," he told the media outside the court. The Supreme Court, meanwhile, asked the Varanasi court to not proceed with hearing the Gyanvapi case till the apex court takes up the matter on Friday. Some parts of the complex were also surveyed on May 6 and 7 under a team led by advo-



cate Ajay Mishra, who has since been removed by the court as the advocate commissioner. Mishra also filed a report on the survey he conducted in the court of the District Civil Judge Ravi Kumar Diwakar late Wednesday evening, said Madan Mohan Yadav, who represents the Hindu side in the case.

Mishra was removed by the court Tuesday as the advocate commissioner. After removing him, the court had appointed Vishal Singh as the special advocate commissioner and Ajay Pratap Singh as the assistant advocate commissioner. The reconstituted commission had carried out the survey

on May 14, 15 and 16. Vishal Singh refused to divulge details on the report, saying he has submitted documents, and sealed boxes containing chips of videos and photos. "From my side this is the final report. If the court feels it is sufficient then fine, otherwise we will go by the directions of the court," he said. The Gyanvapi mosque is adjacent to the iconic Kashi Vishwanath temple and the court is hearing a plea by a group of women seeking permission for daily prayers before the idols on its outer walls of the masjid. The court had given the new commission time till May 17 to file the survey report. It had extended the deadline by two days on the request on the survey team.

Appeal filed in SC against Delhi HC's split verdict on criminalisation of marital rape

NEW DELHI: An appeal has been filed in the Supreme Court challenging the Delhi High Court's split verdict on the issue of criminalisation of marital rape on a batch of petitions challenging the exception in the law that exempts husbands from being prosecuted for non-consensual sexual intercourse with their wives. The appeal has been filed by Khushboo Saifi, one of the petitioners before the high court. The high court on May 11 had delivered a split verdict on the issue. However, both the judges --Justice Rajiv Shukdhakar and Justice C Hari Shankar--on the bench concurred with each other for granting a certificate of leave to appeal to the Supreme Court in the matter as it involves substantial questions of law which requires a decision



from the top court. While Justice Shukdhakar, who headed the division bench, favoured striking down the marital rape exception for being "unconstitutional" and said it would be "tragic if a married woman's call for justice is not heard even after 162 years" since the enactment of the IPC, Justice Shankar said the exception under the rape law is not "unconstitutional and was based on an intelligible differential". The petitioners had challenged the constitutionality of the marital rape exception under Section 375 IPC (rape) on grounds that it discriminated against married women who are sexually assaulted by their husbands. Under the exception given in Section 375 of the IPC, sexual intercourse or sexual acts by a man with his wife, the wife not being minor, is not rape. The bench delivered a 393-page split verdict in the matter. Justice Shukdhakar, in the 192 pages penned by him, regretted that he was not able to persuade Justice Shankar to his point of view and said he, perhaps, hears a beat of a different drummer. I respect that. Justice Shankar, who gave dissenting views in 200 pages written by him, said the challenge to the vires of the second exception to Section 375 and Section 376B of the IPC and Section 198B of the Code of Criminal Procedure, as raised in these petitions, must fail.

1988 road rage case: SC sentences Navjot Singh Sidhu to 1 yr rigorous imprisonment



The Supreme Court on Thursday sentenced Congress leader Navjot Singh Sidhu to one year rigorous imprisonment in a 1988 road rage case, saying victims of crime are humiliated when the offender is let off with a relatively minor punishment. In 2018, Sidhu was let off with a meagre fine of Rs 1,000. The review plea was filed by the family members of 65-year-old Gurnam Singh, who had died in the road rage incident involving Sidhu. A bench of Justices A.M. Khanwilkar and Sanjay Kishan Kaul said: "A disproportionately light punishment humiliates and frustrates a victim of crime when the offender goes unpunished or is let off with a relatively minor punishment as the system pays no attention to the injured's feelings." It observed that indifference to the rights of the victim of crime is fast eroding the faith of the society in general and the victim of crime in particular in the criminal justice system. The bench pointed out that the sentencing philosophy for an offence has a social goal that the sentence has to be based on the principle that the accused must realise that the crime committed by him has not only created a dent in his life but also a concavity in the social fabric. Allowing the review petition, the bench said: "We consider it appropriate to impose a sentence of imprisonment for a period of one-year rigorous imprisonment to be undergone by respondent No.1 (Sidhu)."

5G set to spawn massive job opportunities: Telecom Secretary

The advent of 5G and new services that it would usher, will spawn fresh job opportunities in the market, requiring suitable skilling of manpower in new technologies, Telecom Secretary K Rajaraman said on Wednesday. Rajaraman, who was speaking at an event of Telecom Sector Skill Council (TSSC), said that from BharatNet to space communications, and from 5G to fixed-line broadband services, the telecom sector would unlock new job requirements of various categories. He exhorted the industry to look closely at creation of the talent pipeline to address these emerging opportunities. "5G growth will come from number of use case it would permit in various industrial settings...5G, because of nature of technology and capability it offers, will open up new range of skills," Rajaraman said. The top



DoT official affirmed that 5G will spur jobs in areas like Augmented Reality, Virtual Reality, Internet of Things and other areas. Fixed wireline broadband too, where penetration levels are low, in fact, far below the global benchmarks, has the clear headroom for double-digit growth, he pointed out. "Soon we hope to address the policy constraints which are facing fixed wireline industry and see how we can provide the push needed to take the industry forward," he said adding that the high growth rates can absolutely be afforded given the potential and the current small base. "...the jobs that can be provided, are phenomenal," he emphasised.

Indrani Mukerjea gets bail by SC in Sheena Bora murder case

The Supreme Court on Wednesday granted bail to Indrani Mukerjea, the prime accused in the murder of her daughter Sheena Bora, saying that six-and-a-half years in prison is too long a term and that the trial will not be completed anytime soon. A three-judge bench headed by Justice L Nageswara Rao noted that Indrani Mukerjea has been in jail since 2015, and said the trial is not going to be completed anytime soon as out of 237 witnesses cited by prosecution only 68 have been examined till date. "The petitioner is charged with kidnapping with an intention to murder her daughter after entering into a criminal conspiracy. The petitioner is wife of Peter Mukerjea, who is co accused in the case. The allegation made against the



petitioner is that she planned the murder in view of the live in relationship of her daughter with Rahul Mukerjea, who is the son of Peter Mukerjea through his earlier wife," the bench said. "We do not intend to make comments on the merits of the case as it might be detrimental to the interests of the parties. Taking into account that petitioner has been in custody for six-and-a-half-years and even if 50 per cent witnesses are given by prosecution, the trial would not be over soon, we are of the considered view that the petitioner is entitled to be released on bail. "Petitioner is directed to be released on bail subject to satisfaction of the trial court and the same conditions imposed earlier (on Peter Mukerjea)," the bench also comprising Justices B R Gavai and A S Bopanna said.

SC directs issuance of Aadhaar cards to sex workers

The Supreme Court on Thursday directed the issuance of Aadhaar cards to sex workers based on a proforma certificate issued by the Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) and observed that every person has a fundamental right to be treated with dignity. A bench headed by Justice L Nageswara Rao said there should be no breach of the confidentiality of the sex workers and their identity should not be revealed. "Aadhaar cards shall be issued to sex workers on the basis of a proforma certificate issued by the Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) and submitted by a gazetted officer at the National AIDS Control Organisation (NACO) or the project director of State AIDS Control Society along with the enrolment form," the bench also comprising Justices B R Gavai and A S Bopanna said.



and A S Bopanna said. While passing the order, the bench observed that "every person has the right to be treated with dignity irrespective of activity. This should be kept in mind." UIDAI had earlier suggested to the top court that Aadhaar Card could be issued to sex workers without insisting on proof of identity, subject to their producing a certificate issued by a Gazetted Officer of NACO or a Gazetted Officer of Health Department of the respective State Governments/ Union Territory.

Security tightened as MNS, BJP call for uprooting Aurangzeb's grave

MUMBAI: The security in and around the grave of Mughal Emperor Aurangzeb in Khuldabad was tightened following calls by Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and Maharashtra Navnirman Sena (MNS) to 'uproot' it, here on Wednesday. While MNS activist Gajanan Kale on Tuesday questioned the need for preserving Aurangzeb's grave, BJP MLC Prasad Lad threatened to remove the small monument which is one of the major tourist attractions in and around Aurangabad. In the wake of the potential



threats to the grave, the Maharashtra Police and Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) have deployed additional guards and a van at the site, though it is still open for public. Demanding that the extra security must be immediately removed, Lad asked whether

this is the 'Hindutva brand' of Chief Minister Uddhav Thackeray, when chanting Hanuman Chalisa is considered sedition. "This is the same Aurangzeb who executed Chhatrapati Sambhaji Maharaj (the son of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj), demolished Hindu temples to construct mosques. Now, the CM is providing security to Aurangzeb's grave. Is this Sonia Gandhi-Sharad Pawar style of Hindutva or the Hindutva of the late Balasaheb Thackeray," Lad asked.

Samajwadi Party leader Azam Khan released from prison

Senior Samajwadi Party leader Azam Khan walked out of the Sitapur Jail in Uttar Pradesh on Friday morning, a day after the Supreme Court granted him interim bail in a cheating case. Khan's son and MLA Abdullah Azam, Pragatisheel Samajwadi Party (Lohiya) leader Shivpal Singh Yadav and a large number of supporters welcomed the senior SP leader upon his release after 27 months. Azam Khan had 88 cases, including that of land grabbing, registered against him. On Thursday, the Supreme Court granted him interim bail in a cheating case, paving the way for his release. Samajwadi Party president Akhilesh Yadav welcomed Khan's release. "Hearty welcome to senior SP leader and MLA Azam Khan on his release on bail. With this bail decision, the Supreme Court has set new standards of justice. He will certainly be acquitted in all



other false cases. Lies have moments, not centuries," Yadav said in a tweet in Hindi. Shivpal Singh Yadav posted on Twitter pictures with Khan outside the jail. The jailor of Sitapur prison, R S Yadav, said the release order was received around 11 pm on Thursday and after following all procedures, Khan was released around 8 am on Friday. A Supreme Court bench headed by Justice L Nageswara Rao directed Khan to file for regular bail within two weeks and asked the trial court to decide it on merits without being influenced by any of the observations of the top court.

Senior official Himachal reviews preparations ahead of Modi's visit

Himachal Pradesh Chief Secretary Ram Subhag Singh on Tuesday held a review meeting with the officials to take a stock of the preparations ahead of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's scheduled visit to the hill state on May 31. Earlier, on Sunday (May 15), Himachal Pradesh BJP president Suresh Kashyap said Modi will visit Shimla on May 31 to celebrate the completion of eight years of the government at the Centre. Meanwhile, Himachal Pradesh Chief Minister Jai Ram Thakur has visited the well-known Ridge Maidan in Shimla. He inspected and reviewed the preparations for the Prime Minister's public rally. The state government is trying to make the proposed event in Shimla a 'launch pad' for the upcoming Assembly elections. Meanwhile, the Chief Secretary has said the state government has implemented various welfare schemes to fulfil the needs of poor people. He added that during the May 31 programme, the Prime Minister is scheduled to hold a virtual interaction with the beneficiaries of 11 such schemes. In the virtual programme, along with 773 districts of the country, 40 beneficiaries from Himachal Pradesh's 12 districts will also participate in the dialogue session with Modi. Ram Subhag Singh added that the Prime Minister will also release the 11th installment of the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi Yojana during this programme. He said digital screens would be installed to ensure the participation of the beneficiaries in the virtual programme. Several other top officials also participated in the review meeting of the preparations related to the PM Modi's public event.

India successfully flight tests naval anti-ship missile



The Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) and Indian Navy Wednesday successfully conducted the maiden flight-test of indigenously-developed Naval anti-ship missile launched from a Naval helicopter from Integrated Test Range (ITR), Chandipur off the coast of Odisha, DRDO sources said. The mission met all its objectives. It is the first indigenous air launched anti-ship missile system developed for the Indian Navy, they said. The missile followed the desired sea skimming trajectory and reached the designated target with high degree of accuracy, validating the control, guidance and mission algorithms, they said. Stating that all sub-systems performed satisfactorily, DRDO said that sensors deployed across the test range and near impact point tracked the missile trajectory and captured all events. The missile employed many new technologies, including an indigenously developed launcher for the helicopter. The missile guidance system includes state-of-the-art navigation system and integrated avionics. The flight test was witnessed by senior officers of DRDO and the Indian Navy.

CBI books Karti Chidambaram over illegal gratification

The CBI has registered a new case against Lok Sabha MP Karti Chidambaram, son of former finance minister P Chidambaram, for allegedly receiving illegal gratification, officials said on Tuesday. Following the registration of the FIR, the CBI on Tuesday morning started searches at nine premises of Chidambaram in Chennai and other cities in the country, they said.

Mamata lashes out at Modi over price hike

Hitting out at the Centre over hike in domestic gas and fuel prices, TMC supremo and West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee on Wednesday accused the BJP-led government of "looting" the common people. She also accused the Narendra Modi government of engineering communal disturbances to divert people's attention from issues affecting them such as price rise. "The Centre is looting the common people by hiking prices of domestic gas, petrol and diesel. To divert attention of the common people, the Narendra Modi government is engineering communal disturbances," Banerjee claimed while speaking at a party programme at Medinipur College ground here. Banerjee is on a tour of the western district.

Floods affect nearly 2 lakh people in Assam

Around 2 lakh people in 20 districts of Assam have been affected by floods, with the hill district of Dima Hasao getting cut off from the rest of the state after landslides triggered by incessant rain snapped rail and road links, an official bulletin said on Monday. Two flood-related deaths were reported in Cachar district, while three fatalities due to landslides were earlier recorded in Dima Hasao.



National Disaster Response Force (NDRF), State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), Fire and Emergency Services, besides locals, have been carrying out rescue operations in the flood-hit areas. Embankments have been breached at 16 locations in different districts in the last 24 hours. Roads, bridges and houses have been completed or partially damaged in several areas. Communication channels have also been snapped in Dima Hasao. "Due to landslides, the district cannot be approached from outside. All roads and railways leading to Haflong is blocked since May 15," the bulletin said. A Northeast Frontier Railway (NFR) release in Guwahati said evacuation of about 2,800 passengers of two trains, which were stranded along the Lumding-Badarpur section in Dima Hasao for the last two days due to landslides and waterlogging on tracks, was completed on Monday. Many passengers were airlifted by the Indian Air Force even as incessant rain impeded rescue operations which were underway since Saturday, it said. "Having rescued and evacuated all the passengers, the Railways is now putting its efforts in restoring the damaged line and re-starting the train services to South Assam, Manipur, Tripura and Mizoram," it said. The New Haflong Railway Station is completely inundated with debris and an empty passenger train standing at the station has been washed off from the tracks due to a massive landslide, it said.

Gujarat Patidar leader Hardik Patel quits Congress

Gujarat Patidar quota agitation spearhead Hardik Patel on Wednesday said he has resigned as the Gujarat Congress working president as well as from the party's primary membership. Patel submitted his resignation letter to Congress president Sonia Gandhi. "Today, after mustering courage, I am resigning from the party post and primary membership of the Congress. I hope my followers and people of Gujarat will welcome my step. I believe that I will be able to serve the state better after this step," he tweeted.

Samajwadi Party MP asks opposition to counter Shivling 'propaganda'

Samajwadi Party MP Shafiqur Rehman Barq on Thursday said the claimed discovery of a Shivling in Varanasi's Gyanvapi mosque complex was false propaganda and urged opposition parties to counter it. The local MP said Hindus and Muslims should ensure that such propaganda is stopped as every mosque is now being seen with suspicion. He asked why Muslims would keep a Shivling at their place of worship as this would be idol worship, which is against the Shariat. Earlier this week, Hindu lawyers had claimed that a structure found in the 'wazookhana' reservoir at the mosque during a court-ordered survey was a Shivling. The mosque committee members disputed the claim, saying the structure was part of the fountain mechanism at the wazookhana, where people perform ritual ablutions before offering namaz. The MP termed the BJP an RSS organisation and accused both bodies of trying to spoil the atmosphere in the country. He said the Waqf board and the All India Muslim Personal Law Board and other responsible people should work together to save the country and the Muslim community. Barq also questioned the Uttar Pradesh government's recent decision not to provide grants to new madrasas. "This is the result of a conspiracy to hurt Muslims. This is propaganda so that Muslims can't get education," he claimed.



Fiscal dilemmas and GST concerns of various states

Pronouncing its verdict on a protracted dispute over the levy of Goods and Services Tax (GST) on ocean freight charges paid by importers, the Supreme Court recently held that such a tax was untenable. Its 153-page judgment has also dwelt at length on the nature of the recommendations of the GST Council, the constitutional body set up to oversee the operations of the indirect tax regime. Invoking the spirit of cooperative federalism, the Court has held that both the Union and State legislatures have “equal, simultaneous and unique powers” to make GST laws, and the recommendations of the Council, where they have a one-third and two-thirds voting share, respectively, are not binding on them. While amending the Constitution to pave way for the tax system that subsumed multiple central and State levies, Parliament had intended for the Council’s recommendations to only have ‘a persuasive value’, as per the Court. This has sparked fears that individual States can start vetoing the Council’s recommendations that they do not agree with, and refuse to implement them, thus threatening the ‘One Nation, One Tax’ edifice of a reform that took years to bring about. Opposition-ruled States have hailed the verdict as upholding their rights vis-à-vis what a few termed as the ‘arbitrary imposition’ of Centre’s decisions in the Council. While North Block undertakes a detailed review of the verdict, it is pertinent that it had argued that if the Council’s recommendations were not binding, it would lead to an impasse and the entire GST structure would crumble. This does not hold water, the Court averred. That it has struck down a tax notified two days prior to the launch of the GST regime just as it is on the verge of completing five years, is perhaps, a fortuitous nudge for introspection on its journey and the way ahead. Meanwhile, the taxpayers keep their fingers crossed.

The real ‘Pan-Indian’ cinema



The recent South Indian films, Pushpa, RRR, and KGF 2 are rewriting Indian film history. A few years ago, it would have been unthinkable that a Telugu and Kannada film, dubbed in Hindi, would become the highest all-time grossers in Hindi. This has led to an animated discussion about not only the supposed decline of Bollywood but also the emergence of a new “pan-Indian” cinema.

The rise of the southern film industries, hitherto marginalised as “regional” cinema, and the challenge to the domination of Hindi cinema is indeed a welcome development. But its celebration as pan-Indian cinema, breaking language and culture barriers, is premature without discussing what these films represent. These three recent films (two of which have crossed the stratospheric collection record of 1,000 crore), and Baahubali before, indicate that they do not challenge dominant ideas of a homogenous nationalism, caste hierarchies, toxic masculinity, or gratuitous violence. Neither do they offer any cultural authenticity.

Such “massified” commercial films (albeit in new linguistic registers and with vastly superior technical quotient and cinematic experience) targeting the national market and the “lowest common denominator”, may in fact be counterproductive to the idea of linguistic/cultural plurality and the exploration of novel and progressive themes. Because the barriers to better, and world-class cinema is not merely the domination of Hindi films. Recently, Telugu superstar Chiranjeevi spoke about the insult he felt in the 1980s at a national award function where Indian cinema was portrayed as Hindi cinema, and how the recent South films have become a vehicle to correct that notion. The same was also reflected in Kannada star Sudeep’s comments on the claim of Hindi as the national language.

Yet, this “regional” claim for an equal place in Indian cinema does not refer to the exclusions, and cultural homogenisation performed by the mega-budget, pan-Indian film emerging from the South.

Thus, RRR, for example, is steeped in a religious-inflected nationalism with a cartoonish and melodramatic take on colonialism:

the evil British versus the good Indians. It is perfectly in sync with the present climate of aggressive nationalism even though it seeks to speak from a linguistic marginality. In this nationalism, while Subhas Bose, Sardar Patel, Bhagat Singh, Shivaji, and others from the South are unsurprisingly present, Gandhi, Ambedkar and Nehru are missing.

More seriously problematic is the appropriation of the trope of Adivasi liberation to the nationalist cause, and thus making it seem that the oppressors of Adivasis were merely the British. This is a move, as I have argued before, seen in movies like Lagaan. One of the two heroes Bheem, who is purportedly based on the legendary — but ignored — Gond leader Komaram Bheem, is shown in the film as asking the other protagonist Ram, a savarna Hindu, to educate him. This, writer Akash Poyam (a Gond himself) points out, casts Bheem as an innocent “noble savage” while in reality it was Komaram Bheem who coined the slogan, “Jal, Jangal, Jameen” which is shown as being inscribed by Ram in the film.

Other films like Pushpa and KGF are also not breaking any new ground, but reinforcing many of the tired masala conventions like a poor hero taking on the state-criminal nexus and as a saviour of the toiling masses, etc. Yet, they have been lauded as catering to small-town India, and the so-called

masses, something which Bollywood has largely moved away from with its focus on the urban middle classes, the elite, NRIs and multiplexes. But this is a reductive understanding which posits the masses as capable of appreciating cinema only with excessive violence, misogyny and the low brow, and the urban rich as not the purveyors of the same. Yet, the recent blockbusters drew big crowds in the multiplexes as well as in the diasporic audiences.

Similarly, some scholars have argued that the success of Pushpa and KGF is that they exemplify the local against the nationalist rhetoric of the Hindi cinema, a contention that is questioned by the success of Baahubali and RRR.

There is a need to go beyond such simple/only binaries of local vs. national, class vs. mass and Hindi vs. non-Hindi, or the anointing of new formulaic productions with monster budgets and targeting the national market as a pan-Indian film. Instead, there is a need to conceive pan-Indian cinema as one which is socially and cinematically expanding boundaries, culturally rooted and yet nationally/globally resonant, and as one which is a conversation among the languages. The seeds of such a pan-Indian cinema were already present before the market success of the recent South blockbusters.

Pushing the envelope
For a decade now, the “new generation” films in Malayalam have rewritten Indian cinema history in their own way, and have captured national attention, especially since the flourishing of OTT platforms. There has been an explosion of films, especially small ones, dealing with an array of subjects and pushing the envelope in so many directions. Films like Maheshinte Prathikaram, Ozhiyudivasathe Kali, Ottal, Angamaly Diaries, Kumbalangi Nights, Jallikattu, The Great Indian Kitchen, Pada, and so many others became successful because they moved away from male superstar-driven formulas.

Yet, if new Malayalam cinema has not fully contended with caste, there has been a veritable revolution in tackling caste oppression in Tamil cinema from the 2010s with films like Attakathi, Madras, Kabali, Kaala, Pariyerum Perumal, Asuran, Karnan, Sarpatta Parambarai and Jai Bhim. They also showed that films with radical themes are not dichotomous with superstars starring in them or mass commercial success. The latter was also proved with the huge all-India success of the Marathi film Sairat.

An empty celebration of the present southern blockbusters as pan-Indian cinema is scotching the above trends besides ignoring other possibilities within Kannada and Telugu industries themselves which produced excellent small films and cultural nuggets like Thithi and C/oKancharapalem.

Thus, the scope for a real pan-Indian cinema is immense but can be only realised by the infrastructure (theatrical, and not just OTT) to experience the best cinematic content across different Indian languages. Until the Indian audience is able to, for instance, watch the National Award winning Byari, in the tiny Beary language, or the internationally acclaimed Khasi film lewduh in their own languages (not just in English), the idea of a real pan-Indian cinema would be stillborn.

Pockets of hope, linking nature and humanity



Biodiversity is the living fabric of our planet. It underpins human well-being in the present and in the future, and its rapid decline threatens nature and people alike.

According to the Global Assessment Report on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services released in 2019 by the Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) at the UNESCO headquarters in Paris, the main global drivers of biodiversity loss are climate change, invasive species, over-exploitation of natural resources, pollution and urbanisation.

Because of our collective excesses, the ecological carrying capacity of planet earth has largely been exceeded. This trend needs to be redressed, with cleaner air, high quality drinking water, and enough food and healthy habitats to ensure that ecosystem services continue to benefit humanity without critically affecting nature’s balance. Whether we look at nature from an environmental, from a cultural or even from a religious point of view, it is our responsibility and clearly in our interest to respect the environment.

In fact, the possibilities exist, and all is not lost. In the last 50 years or so, much has been accomplished for the protection of nature, including the establishment of conservation areas, and a number of international conventions have been signed and ratified.

One of the best mechanisms that has been created is the World Network of Biosphere Reserves, created in 1971 by UNESCO. Biosphere reserves are plac-

es where humans live in harmony with nature, and where there is an effective combination of sustainable development and nature conservation. They represent pockets of hope and proof that we are not inexorably headed towards a doomsday ecological scenario, provided we take appropriate action.

In South Asia, over 30 biosphere reserves have been established. The first one was the Hurlu Biosphere Reserve in Sri Lanka, which was designated in 1977 and comprises 25,500 hectares within the tropical dry evergreen forest.

In India, the first biosphere reserve was designated by UNESCO in 2000 within the blue mountains of the Nilgiris. It stretches across the States of Tamil Nadu, Karnataka and Kerala. The network has gone from strength to strength, and it now counts 12 sites, with Panna, in the State of Madhya Pradesh, as the latest inscription in 2020.

We need many more biosphere reserves and pockets of hope, and the region offers countless options.

Diverse systems
South Asia has a very diverse set of ecosystems. To begin with, Bhutan, India and Nepal combined have thousands of glaciers, surrounded by lakes and alpine ecosystems.

The Khangchendzonga Biosphere Reserve, established in 2018, is a good model. It includes some of the highest ecosystems in the world, with elevations up to 8,586 metres. The reserve is home to orchids and rare plant species. At the same time, more than 35,000 people live there. Their main economic activities are crop production, animal husbandry, fishing, dairy products and poultry farming.

Bangladesh, India, the Maldives, and Sri Lanka all have extensive coastlines, with coral reefs and mangrove forests. These areas are exposed to extreme weather events (storms, floods, droughts), and sea-level rise.

The Maldives are recognised as the lowest-lying country in the world, with a mere elevation of 1.5 metres above the high tide mark. Together with UNESCO, the archipelago has embarked on a plan to establish pilot sites for the conservation and restoration of coastal ecosystems, and to enhance the population’s knowledge on climate change adaptation. Separately, three biosphere reserves have already been created in the Maldives.

Run on science-based plans
UNESCO Biosphere Reserves have all developed science-based management plans, where local solutions for sustainable human living and nature conservation are being tested and best practices applied. Issues of concern include biodiversity, clean energy,

climate, environmental education, and water and waste management, supported by scientific research and monitoring. The aim is to detect changes and find solutions to increase climate resilience.

All biosphere reserves are internationally recognised sites on land, at the coast, or in the oceans. Governments alone decide which areas to nominate. Before approval by UNESCO, the sites are externally examined. If approved, they will be managed based on an agreed plan, reinforced by routine checks to ensure credibility, but all remain under the sovereignty of their national government.

Some of the countries in South Asia do not yet have any or enough biosphere reserves. In most if not all cases, the political will is certainly there but there is a lack of know-how and financial resources. Of course, more financial support from richer nations and from the private sector would be desirable for establishing biosphere reserves in these countries.

The priority countries
Bangladesh, Bhutan, and Nepal are on the priority list of UNESCO, because they do not yet have any biosphere reserves. Their governments are already working on their first nomination files. Our organisation also believes that it would be important to increase the number of biosphere reserves in India, the Maldives and Sri Lanka.

The BSE Carbonex is a thematic index which measures companies' ability to address climate change risk and opportunity. The index is based on the S&P BSE 100, with the constituent weights modified in accordance with the companies' relative carbon performance as measured by the level of their greenhouse gas emissions and carbon policies.

Product innovation in bond markets has helped in bridging the funding gap. Healthcare is the gov's responsibility

Last year people were so scared of Covid that the profits of the insurance industry increased manifold. Because of this, health insurance premiums in India registered a growth of 25 percent last year. A report by the National Insurance Academy, which works under the Union Finance Ministry, revealed that in the year 2020-21, insurance companies collected Rs 58,572 crore as medical insurance premium, while in the next financial year this figure increased to Rs 73,330 crore. The report, released at an event of the PHD Chamber of Commerce and Industry, said that the health insurance market in India has been growing steadily at a compound annual growth rate of 24 percent, but it grew by around 34 percent during the phase of pandemic. According to NITI Aayog, 69 crore people are members of Ayushman Bharat scheme, while



26 crore people in the country are already associated with some health insurance scheme. That is, 70 percent of the citizens of the country are part of some health insurance scheme, the remaining 30 percent of the population, that is, around 400 million people are not yet part of any health insurance.

The central government also wants to connect 400 million uninsured Indians with the Ayushman scheme. The Na-

tional Health Authority and NITI Aayog have prepared its draft on the subject. To take advantage of the scheme, each of these individuals will have to pay an annual premium of Rs 250 to 300, in return for which each of them will be able to get free treatment of up to Rs 5 lakh in a year. This will also include the facility of being treated in a private ward. This facility is not available in the current Ayushman scheme. The new scheme

may be implemented in the next few months. Under the Ayushman scheme, treatment can be done in any hospital associated with the PM-JAY scheme of the government. Even medical facilities will be available in other states. Meanwhile, the Rajasthan government is promoting its own insurance scheme through advertisements. For the first time, a state government has done a work of winning the hearts of the people by announcing the same free facility for all the citizens.

Health is a matter related to everyone and in the changed circumstances, health care has become a very costly affair, which is not available to everyone. Health insurance is expensive and not reliable either. The problems related to health insurance of private insurance companies come out every day. In such a situation, the Chief Minister Chiranjeevi Health Insurance Scheme of Rajasthan government is a commendable initiative.

Biyani president of Yamunanagar Plywood Manufacturers Association told that the industry is presently doing export of plywood for value worth Rs 400 crore only as against expected amount worth Rs 5000 crore in case given assistance by the government. He said, plywood



industry in the town is using hardly 30-40% of their production capacity and facing severe slump since past few years.

While addressing a large gathering of plywood manufacturers in the area and traders from all over in the state, Chief Minister Khatter announced several schemes for welfare of plywood manufacturers as well as exporters in the town to bring identification to plywood industry like in past not only in the country

but all over the world. He declared to waive of 2% market fee on manufacturing of plywood to be exported, which will be refunded to the manufacturers immediately after despatch. Khat-

ter said, Haryana state government will also provide benefit of value Rs 48000 annually to each youth employee originally hailing from Haryana state employed by the manufacturers.

Khatter said, Yamunanagar plywood industry may achieve lost identification by increasing exports for which state government has already prepared a road map. He said, in case of wood export Kerala state is leading in the country. Chander Mohan Patwari Industry Minister from Assam was also present at the occasion and suggested use of bamboo readily available in his state used as raw material in manufacture of plywood as an substitute for popular not easily available and being arranged by plywood manufacturers from other districts in the state as well as from U.P. Among other bureaucrats present in Conclave were senior officers from industry department in the state, Ministry

of MSME, representatives from Indian Embassy in Thailand and Indian Embassy in Behran.

Khatter announced opening of first most awaited Forest Research Institute in Haryana state at Yamunanagar on which amount worth Rs 50 crore will be spent by the government since plywood manufacturers had to visit Forest Research Institute at Dehradun quite often to seek technical guidance. Plywood manufacturers said, Forest Research Institute at Yamunanagar will provide oxygen to collapsing Yamunanagar plywood industry. They told that earlier nearly 500 trucks containing plywood manufactured in the town were being despatched to other states daily, which have now been reduced to hardly 200-250 trucks at present and most of the migrant labourers from U.P, Bihar and M.P has started leaving for their home states in search of work.

How to Curb Inflation in India

The ghost of inflation is always a big threat to every ruling party's economic and political stability, not only in India but in the whole world. Inflation may be beneficial for big corporates in the short run, but it is always harmful and puts a dent in the middle class's savings and ruins the poor class. The weightage of food items is 47% of the Wholesale Price Index (April 2022) in India.

Although the abundance production of food grains, pulses, and vegetables break all records in the last few years, still their prices are very high and vegetables and fruits are out of the reach of poor men and gulping the savings of the middle class. Food inflation is set to explore new heights (Food, and oil prices push inflation to 8 years high) after 2014. The reason behind all this is the increasing fuel prices as the transportation cost of every product is increasing. Some economists suggest that to control inflation govt. should use contractionary monetary and fiscal policies by increasing interest rates and reducing public expenditure but they do not want to see the elephant of inflation in the room. Inflation always doesn't mean an excess supply of money; it may be because of a shortage of production of goods and services as in Sri Lanka.

After the pandemic, the maximum number of people lost their employment. 52% of people were either with no income or have



decreased income. Because of this demand for poor people decreased as they have no money to spend and on the other side cash became king for the middle class. The overall effect was that the aggregate demand decreased in the economy and because of the lack of any demand booster the investors stopped investment and demand for blue-collar and white-collar workers decreased and this multiplied the unemployment in the economy. In Haryana, the unemployment rate was a maximum of about 34% in April 2022 more than the national average.

If income increases the people will demand more, although its immediate effect that prices may increase if income and supply of goods and services will increase simultaneously than overall effect will be that growth and investment rate will increase in the economy.

How to curb inflation : We have to adopt practical methods instead of traditional methods to curb inflation and

methods that are appropriate for the Indian economy as this economy is a developing economy. European economies are developed economies so their methods to control inflation are not suitable for the Indian economy.

We can give boosters to the middle class to spend more with the tools of expansionary fiscal and monetary policy. By expansionary fiscal policy govt. can increase employment opportunities in the economy and purchasing power of people will increase and demand will also increase and will stimulate investment in the private sector. In this way, two birds will be killed with one stone. A new start-up will do net investment or will use already excess production capacity will produce more, more production can control inflation but the condition is that the prices of raw material and intermediate inputs should remain constant.

For the desired results fuel prices and Agri products Prices

should be controlled. We cannot blame the Russia-Ukraine war anymore for rising fuel prices. Farmers should be compensated for low agriculture product prices by giving them more direct benefits or subsidies, as America does. Indian economy is an agrarian economy.

If the aggregate supply of output does not increase proportionately in the short run, this will cause demand-supply imbalances which will lead to demand-pull inflation in the economy, that is, the general rise in the price level.

Demand-pull inflation can occur when there is an increase in any component of aggregate demand, namely, consumption demand by households, investment by business firms, increase in government expenditure unmatched by an increase in taxes (that is, deficit spending by the government-financed by either creation of new money by the central bank or borrowing by the government from the market).

Let us assume the government adopts an expansionary fiscal policy under which it increases its expenditure without levying extra taxes to finance its increased expenditure by borrowing from the Reserve Bank of India. Demand-pull inflation can be neutralized by more consumer and capital goods production.

The govt. should decrease the rate of direct taxes to boost aggregate demand as the disposal income of the salaried class will increase and they will spend more

and the consumption of one person is the income of others and induced investment increase in the economy. On the other side if govt. does not want to decrease direct taxes and that amount of tax collection should be used for a productive purpose not on extravagant expenditures of the govt.

To illustrate the above point, let us assume that the government adopts an expansionary fiscal policy under which it increases its expenditure on education, health, and defence and finances this extra expenditure by borrowing from the Reserve Bank of India which prints new notes for this purpose. This will lead to an increase in aggregate demand (C + I + G). When aggregate demand for all purposes—consumption, investment, and government expenditure—is in the tune of the supply of goods at current prices, there will be no inflation. For a very short period, there can be supply bottlenecks but after some time when the supply of goods will increase because of new investment or use of excess capacity in production, it will be self-corrective. Since inflation is a continuous increase in the price level, not a one-time rise in it. Before full employment, there is a full possibility in an economy like India as it has not reached the level of full employment like developed economies. According to Credit Vidya agency 10%, the higher industrial output can ease retail inflation by 40 bps. Fuel duty cuts by at least Rs 5 per liter are likely to lower 15-20 bps inflation.

RBI's criticism for 'delayed' rate hike unfair, says D Subbarao



The criticism that the Reserve Bank of India was behind the curve in hiking interest rate to tame rising inflation is unfair, former RBI Governor D Subbarao said on Wednesday and asserted that it is difficult for any central bank to anticipate the future more accurately.

Earlier this month, Monetary Policy Committee (MPC), the central bank's rate-setting panel, surprised the markets with a 40 basis points hike in repo rate in an off-cycle policy meeting. It was also the first rate hike after August 2018, amid spiralling inflation. Subbarao further said given that monetary policy acts with a lag, this rate hike, by itself, is unlikely to bring inflation down in a hurry.

"I saw that the hurried action to tighten monetary conditions through an off-cycle MPC meeting raised several questions," he told PTI in an interview. Subbarao was responding to a question why RBI did not raise

interest rate much earlier despite rising inflation. "Was the RBI sleeping at the wheel even as inflation was soaring? Did it go overboard in prioritizing growth over inflation? Won't the delayed action cost heavily in macroeconomic terms? Will this scrambling hurt RBI's credibility?"

"I believe that this criticism is unfair," he said. Retail inflation surged to an eight-year high of 7.79 per cent in April this year while inflation galloped for the seventh straight month. RBI has been mandated by the government to ensure that inflation remains at 4 per cent with a margin of 2 per cent on either side. While pointing out that the RBI, like other central banks around the world, had to act under astonishing uncertainty brought on by rapidly unfolding geopolitical developments, Subbarao said in early April when the last scheduled MPC meeting took place, the war in Ukraine had been on for weeks, but even

seasoned military experts and experienced diplomats were wrong in predicting its course.

"It's unfair to expect central banks to anticipate the future more accurately," Subbarao asserted. The former RBI Governor noted that the inflation trajectory going forward will depend on the pace and quantum of policy tightening over the next few cycles.

"With credit growth currently only around 9-10 per cent, the recent repo rate hike is unlikely to transmit very strongly," he said, adding that nevertheless, the rate action by RBI will help subdue inflation indirectly - by ensuring that inflation expectations don't get unhinged.

To a question if inflation stays above the RBI's target band, the central bank may have to explain why it is unable to bring it down, he opined that the RBI may face that prospect by September. "Should that contingency arise, the RBI must see that as an opportunity to explain the challenges of policy navigation in extraordinarily uncertain times," Subbarao suggested. According to its inflation targeting mandate, if average inflation rules above the target band for three consecutive quarters, the RBI is enjoined to write a letter to the government explaining the reasons for failure to deliver inflation within the target band and the remedial action taken to get back on target.

The bank has tied up with Institute of Rural Management, Anand to chalk its rural initiative strategy which will look at consumer behaviour, customer satisfaction, service design, and service delivery.

It is looking to build new products and services related to rural transport economy, forest economy, agri economy, and other allied activities, it said, adding that the focus is also on providing one stop shop solution to small farmers, workers, and traders.

Top executives' salaries may jump 8.9% in 2022, highest in 5 yrs: Survey

Salaries of senior executives in India are likely to increase by 8.9 per cent in 2022, highest in five years, amid a recovery in business sentiments post pandemic, according to leading global professional services firm Aon plc.

The Aon's 11th Annual Executive Rewards Survey in India, which analysed data across 475 companies from more than 20 industries, further noted that the median CEO compensation has reached Rs 7.05 crore.

With fundamentals of the economy remaining strong and



business sentiments positive, there were strong tailwinds which resulted in top executives' salary increase to be projected at 8.9 per cent from 7.9 per cent in 2021, it said. Moreover, the pay mix for chief executive officer (CEO) and key CXO roles continue to move

towards higher pay at risk, as per the survey.

CXO roles refer to common c-suite executives including CEO, chief financial officer (CFO), chief operating officer (COO), and chief information officer (CIO). Pay at Risk - which is the sum of variable pay and long-term incentives (LTI) to total compensation - for CEOs stands near 60 per cent, while C-level executives including COO, CFO, sales head and chief human resources officer follow closely behind at 50 per cent, as per the survey.

RBI to pay Rs 30,307 crore dividend to govt for FY22

Reserve Bank of India (RBI) on Friday said its board has approved a dividend payment of Rs 30,307 crore to the government for the financial ended March 2022.

The board approved the transfer of Rs 30,307 crore as surplus to the central government for the accounting year 2021-22 while deciding to maintain the Contingency Risk Buffer at 5.50 per cent, RBI said in a statement.

The decision on the divi-



dent payment was made in the 596th meeting of the Central Board of Directors of RBI, headed by Governor Shaktikanta Das, held on Friday.

Last year in May, RBI declared a dividend of Rs 99,122 crore for the nine-month peri-

od (July 2020 to March 2021). The dividend was paid for that period as RBI aligned its financial year with the government's financial year.

Earlier, RBI used to follow July-June period earlier as against government's April-March financial year.

During its meeting, the board reviewed the current economic situation, global and domestic challenges and the impact of recent geopolitical developments.

Odisha govt approves Rs 429cr for mega aluminium park

BHUBANESWAR: Odisha government Wednesday made a budgetary provision of Rs 428.95 crore for development of a mega aluminium park in Angul.

The decision in this regard was taken at a state cabinet meeting chaired by Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik here.

It also approved a new scheme - Financial Assistance for Development of Mega Aluminium Park at Angul, along with the budgetary support for IDCO (Odisha Industrial Infrastructure Development Corporation), the implementing agency. The project will be implemented during the period from 2021-22 to 2023-24, Chief



Secretary S C Mohapatra told reporters here.

Among other decisions, Mohapatra said the cabinet approved proposals for creation of land bank for industry and infrastructure, sanctioned grant-in-aid in favour of 24 private upper primary schools and enactment of a separate legislation for setting up of a self-financed private university.

Sensex tanks over 1,400 pts amid global market rout



MUMBAI: Equity benchmarks fell sharply on Thursday, mirroring a sell-off in global markets, with the Sensex and Nifty tumbling over 2.60 per cent on across-the-board selling.

Persistent foreign fund outflows also continue to dampen sentiment. The 30-share BSE benchmark Sensex dived 1,416.30 points or 2.61 per cent to settle at 52,792.23. During the day, it tumbled 1,539.02 points or 2.83 per cent to 52,669.51.

The broader NSE Nifty tanked 430.90 points or 2.65 per cent to end at 15,809.40. From the Sensex firms, HCL Technologies, Wipro, Infosys, TCS, Tech Mahindra, Tata Steel, IndusInd Bank and Kotak Mahindra Bank were the major laggards. ITC and Dr Reddy's emerged as the gainers. Barring Shanghai, other Asian markets ended lower, with Seoul, Hong Kong and Tokyo settling in the red. Equity exchanges in Europe were also trading sharply lower in the afternoon session. Stock markets in the US had ended deep in the red on Wednesday.

"US markets saw the worst sell-off since June 2020 as inflation fear looms," said Mohit Nigam, Head - PMS, Hem Securities. Meanwhile, international oil benchmark Brent crude declined 1.29 per cent to USD 107.7 per barrel. Foreign institutional investors offloaded shares worth a net Rs 1,254.64 crore on Wednesday, as per stock exchange data. "Deteriorating macro sentiments such as soaring inflation, recession fears, and the prospect of the Federal Reserve getting even more hawkish will continue to keep benchmarks on the edge.

Sri Lanka receives USD 160 mln from World Bank; PM says looking at possibility of using some of it to buy fuel

Sri Lanka has received USD 160 Million from the World Bank and is looking at the possibility of using some of it to buy fuel, Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe told Parliament on Wednesday, as protests continued in the country against the ongoing fuel and gas shortages caused by the economic crisis.

"160 million dollars has been received from the World Bank and a grant from the ADB (Asian Development Bank) is also expected," Wickremesinghe said. He said the money received from the World Bank cannot be used to buy fuel. "We are trying to see if we can use some of it for fuel purchases," he said. Wickremesinghe in his address to the nation on Monday said that two more petrol shipments under the Indian credit line were due this week and by May 29. His remarks came as angry protesters blocked several roads here on Wednesday as part of the protest against ongoing fuel and gas shortages caused by the economic crisis.

Rs 14.10 lakh crore of taxes collected this year shows that more and more people are complying with the law voluntarily: Shri Kamlesh Varshney

NEW DELHI: "This year we have collected Rs 14.10 lakh crore of taxes. I am really thankful to all the taxpayers because it's reflection of the fact that more people are getting aware of their tax responsibility and understanding the importance of TDS (Tax Deducted at Source)," said Kamlesh Varshney, Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT), Ministry of Finance Joint Secretary at the national seminar on Tax Deduction at Source (TDS). The event was organised by the apex industry body, Associated Chambers of Commerce and Industry of India (ASSOCHAM).

Shri Varshney stressed that there should be a movement to make people realise that tax is your responsibility for nation-building. He said, "It is not something that you have to do because the law requires you to do, but as a citizen of your country it is your responsibility to pay taxes in nation-building. A good collection this year is a reflection of the fact that more people are coming into the formal economy and more people are paying their taxes. And TDS has played a major role in that."

While giving details on how the

TDS operates, the Joint Secretary of CBDT stated one should avoid comparing India with other countries, which are formal economies and have few TDS provisions for resident taxpayers. "India still has a large cash economy and we are moving in that direction, but have not yet reached that stage where most people pay their taxes voluntarily."

To encourage voluntary compliance, the government plans to initiate an e-verification scheme in the next few months. Giving details, Varshney said, "With e-verification scheme, what we plan to do is that the information we have gathered will be given to you about like your spendings, credit card usage, amount won on gamings etc. We are moving away from that stage where whenever we receive information, we reopen your case. The idea is we will do the reopening in the third year."

"For the first two years, it will convey electronically that this is the information. The taxpayer can reply that he has already included this in tax return or it can file updated return, which is why the provision of updation of return was introduced this year.

LPG price hiked by Rs 3.5, crosses Rs 1,000 mark

NEW DELHI: Cooking gas LPG price was on Thursday hiked by Rs 3.50 per cylinder, the second increase in rate this month following the firming of international energy rates.

Non-subsidised LPG now costs Rs 1,003 per 14.2-kg cylinder in the national capital, up from Rs 999.50 previously, according to a price notification of state-owned fuel retailers. This is the second increase in LPG rate this month and the third in less than two months. The price was hiked by Rs 50 per cylinder on March 22 and again by the same quantum on May 7. Since April 2021, prices have risen by Rs 193.5 per cylinder. Petrol and diesel prices however continue to be on freeze for the 43rd day in a row. The pause followed rates being hiked by a record Rs 10 per litre in a matter of 16 days beginning March 22.

Non-subsidised cooking gas is the one that consumers buy after exhausting their quota of 12 cylinders at subsidised or below-market rates.

However, the government pays no subsidy on LPG in most cities and the price of the refill that consumers, including the poor women who got free connection under the



much-talked Ujjwala scheme, is the same as that for non-subsidised or market price LPG.

Non-subsidised LPG costs Rs 1,002.50 per 14.2-kg cylinder in Mumbai while it is priced at Rs 1,018.50 a bottle in Chennai and Rs 1,029 in Kolkata. Rates differ from state to state depending on the incidence of local taxes such as VAT. Prices are higher in states with higher taxes.

Alongside, oil firms also hiked the price of commercial LPG cylinders - the ones used by establishments like hotels

and restaurants - by Rs 8 per cylinder to Rs 2,354 per 19-kg bottle. On May 1, the price of a commercial LPG cylinder was increased by Rs 102.50 to Rs 2,355.50 but on May 7 it was reduced to Rs 2,346.

International oil prices have been on the rise this year. They jumped to a 13-year high of USD 140 per barrel in March before shedding some of the gains. Brent was trading at USD 110.13 per barrel on Thursday. To compound things, the Indian rupee tumbled to Rs 77.74 to

a dollar, making imports costlier. India relies on overseas purchases to meet about 85 per cent of its oil requirement, making it one of the most vulnerable in Asia to higher oil prices.

While India has surplus oil refining capacity, it does not manufacture enough LPG to meet domestic demand and imports significant quantities from nations such as Saudi Arabia. On Wednesday, an oil ministry official stated that the Saudi LPG prices have gone up by 33 per cent while domestic rates have increased by only 11 per

Biden praises Greece for leadership after Russia invasion

US President Joe Biden on Monday thanked Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis for his country's moral leadership in the aftermath of Russia's invasion of Ukraine as the two held talks at the White House on Monday about the ongoing conflict.

Mitsotakis was in Washington to mark a COVID-delayed commemoration of the bicentennial of the start of the Greek War of Independence, a more than eight-year-long struggle that led to the ouster of the Ottoman Empire. He will deliver an address to a joint session of Congress on Tuesday.

But the celebratory moment was shadowed by the most significant fighting on the continent since World War II, and as Biden seeks to keep the West unified as it pressures Russia to end the war. Biden praised Greece for showing moral clarity



by quickly imposing sanctions against Russia following the February 24 invasion, providing Kyiv with military assistance and taking in Ukrainian refugees fleeing the conflict.

"We're helping Ukrainians say no to Russian aggression," Biden said. "And we're saying no to tyranny, to the idea that autocracies will outpace democracies in

the 21st century, because that's what is at stake here in my view.

As Europe looks to wean itself off Russian energy, Mitsotakis has pushed the idea of Greece becoming an energy hub that can bring gas, as well as renewable energies, produced in southwest Asia, the Middle East and Africa to eastern Europe. "Greece plans to play an im-

portant role as a gateway for electricity produced from cheap, renewable sources," Mitsotakis said.

A new Greece-to-Bulgaria pipeline built during the COVID-19 pandemic, tested and due to start commercial operation in June is slated to bring large volumes of gas flow between the two countries in both directions to generate electricity, fuel industry, and heat homes.

The new pipeline connection, called the Gas Interconnector Greece-Bulgaria, will give Bulgaria access to ports in neighbouring Greece that are importing liquefied natural gas, or LNG, and also will bring gas from Azerbaijan through a new pipeline system that ends in Italy. Russia announced last month it was cutting off natural gas exports to Bulgaria and Poland over the countries' refusal to pay in rubles.

N Korea's Kim faces 'huge dilemma' on aid as virus surges



During more than a decade as North Korea's leader, Kim Jong Un has made self-reliance his governing lynchpin, shunning international help and striving instead for domestic strategies to fix his battered economy.

But as an illness suspected to be COVID-19 sickens hundreds of thousands of his people, Kim stands at a critical crossroad: Either swallow his pride and receive foreign help to fight the disease, or go it alone, enduring potential huge fatalities that may undermine his leadership.

Kim Jong Un is in a dilemma, a really huge dilemma, said Lim Eul-chul, a professor at Kyungnam University's Institute for Far Eastern Studies in Seoul. If he accepts US or Western assistance, that can shake the self-reliance stance that he has steadfastly maintained and public confidence in him could be weakened.

Doing nothing, however, could be calamitous.

Since acknowledging a COVID-19 outbreak last week, North Korea has said an explosively spreading fever has killed 56 people and sickened about 1.5 million others. Outside observers suspect most of those cases were caused by the

coronavirus.

Whatever North Korea's state-controlled media says about those who are sick, the outbreak is likely several times worse. North Korea lacks sufficient COVID-19 tests, and experts say it is significantly understating deaths to avoid possible public unrest that could hurt Kim politically.

Some observers say the stated death toll is low for a country where most of the 26 million people are unvaccinated and medicine is in short supply.

The North's apparent under-reporting of deaths is meant to defend Kim's authority as he faces the first and biggest crisis of his decade of rule, Nam Sung-wook, a professor at Korea University, said.

The North Korean outbreak may be linked to a massive military parade in Pyongyang in late April that Kim organised to feature new weapons and loyal troops. The parade drew tens of thousands of soldiers and residents from around the country.

After the event, Kim spent several days taking dozens of commemorative group photos with parade participants, all of whom were without masks. Most of the photos involved

dozens or hundreds of people.

North Korea may be able to publicly hide the real number of deaths, but the country's strengthened restrictions on movement and quarantine rules could hurt its agricultural cultivation. Its economy is already battered by more than two years of pandemic-caused border shutdowns and other curbs.

North Korea is also worried about a shortage of medical supplies and food and daily necessities that have dried up in markets during the border closures, Yang Moo-jin, a professor at Seoul's University of North Korean Studies, said.

They are experiencing another arduous march," Yang said, referring to the state's euphemism for a devastating famine in the 1990s that killed hundreds of thousands of people.

Kim has previously rebuffed millions of doses of vaccines offered by the UN-backed COVAX distribution programme. After the North admitted to an outbreak, South Korea and China offered to send vaccines, medicine and other medical supplies to North Korea. The United States said it supports international aid efforts, though it has no current plans to share its vaccine supplies with the North.

Receiving outside help would put the North, which is always intensely proud, despite its poverty, in a difficult position. Kim had repeatedly touted his country as impregnable to the pandemic during the past two years. On Saturday, however, he said his country faces a great upheaval and that officials must study how China, his country's only major ally, and other nations have handled the pandemic.

UK strongly supports Sweden, Finland joining NATO



LONDON: The UK government has said it strongly supports the expansion of the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) as Sweden and Finland confirmed their intention to apply for membership of the military alliance, in a historic shift of foreign policy stance in the wake of the Russia-Ukraine conflict.

UK Foreign Secretary Liz Truss said on Monday evening that the two Nordic countries should be integrated into NATO, which operates on a collective defence basis under which an attack against any one ally is considered as an attack against all allies.

The UK strongly supports applications for NATO membership from Finland and Sweden. They should be integrated into the alliance as soon as possible; their accession will strengthen the collective security of Europe, said Truss.

We look forward to working with them as new NATO Allies and stand ready to offer them our every assistance during the accession process. Our mutual security declarations signed with Sweden and Finland last week by the Prime Minister [Boris Johnson] demonstrate our steadfast and unequivocal commitment to both countries during this process and beyond, she said.

UN envoy: Talks on now to extend Yemen's 2-month cease-fire



With just two weeks left in a two-month cease-fire in Yemen, the UN envoy to the war-torn country said Tuesday that talks with the government and Houthi rebels are going on right now and he hopes the truce will be extended.

But Hans Grundberg was wary of making any prediction, saying that agreement on an extension would depend on the talks that he and his office are having with the warring parties.

During these past six weeks we have seen considerable positive impact on the daily lives of many Yemenis, he told reporters after a closed briefing to the UN Security Council. First, and most importantly, the truce is holding in military terms.

The two-month truce is the first nationwide cease-fire in six years in Yemen's civil war, which erupted in 2014. That year, the Iranian-backed Houthis seized the capital, Sanaa, and forced the internationally recognised government into exile. A Saudi-led coalition entered the war in early 2015 to try to restore the government to power.

PM Modi to attend Tokyo Quad meet

Prime Minister Narendra Modi will participate in the third Quad leaders summit in Tokyo on May 24, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said on Thursday. MEA Spokesperson Arindam Bagchi said the forthcoming Quad summit will provide an opportunity for the Quad leaders to exchange views about developments in the Indo-Pacific and contemporary global issues of mutual interest. In Tokyo, Modi will have bilateral meetings with Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida and US President Joe Biden, Bagchi said. He is also likely to hold a bilateral meeting with his Australian counterpart.

it said.

President Ram Nath Kovind inaugurated Dr Ambedkar Avenue in downtown Kingston in honour of Babasaheb Dr B.R. Ambedkar, the President's office said on Twitter.

On the occasion, President Kovind said: it fills me with great pride that one of the ablest sons of India has been recognised so far away from his home.

Dr B R Ambedkar is formally known as the architect of the Indian Constitution. He introduced progressive ideas for the social and economic empowerment of the depressed classes into the Indian Constitution. Dr Ambedkar educated and inspired the people towards

the goal of removing inequality, he said.

He noted that some people may wonder about the relevance of Dr Ambedkar to Jamaica.

Let us always remember that icons like Dr Ambedkar and Marcus Garvey cannot be limited to just one nation or community. Their message of equality for all and their appeal to end all forms of discrimination has universal resonance.

COVID has reached N-Korea, threatening a humanitarian emergency

The World Health Organisation declared COVID-19 a pandemic in March 2020. But it's only in recent days, in May 2022, that the secretive North Korea has reported its first confirmed cases of the virus.

While it may seem somewhat astounding that a country has managed to get so far into the pandemic without an outbreak, North Korea has reportedly had its borders sealed since January 2020, with no movement in or out of the country. So it is plausible that they've had no COVID until now.

But now, the country, which has a population of roughly 26 million people, looks to be facing a very sizeable and rapidly-spreading outbreak of the omicron variant.

As of May 17, 1.4 million cases of fever had been reported, with 56 deaths since late April. The country is treating fever as indicative of COVID infection owing to reported shortages of testing supplies.

Of course, we don't know how many of these cases of fever

are definitely COVID, which in theory could lead to an overestimation of case numbers. At the same time, a proportion of cases are likely to be asymptomatic, and a lack of reporting coupled with limited surveillance means there is a likelihood of under-reporting. Either way, these numbers are unlikely to be accurate.

There has been some testing taking place, with an unspecified number of omicron cases confirmed. But ultimately, there are huge gaps in our knowledge about this outbreak. This includes the index case the case which was the source of this outbreak.

North Korea is ill-equipped for a COVID outbreak: The COVID pandemic has highlighted the need for national and global presentations of high-quality real-time data, along with rigorous and mass-scale testing infrastructure, to underpin surveillance and healthcare decision-making. North Korea does not appear to have any of that in place.



Importantly, there is also no known COVID vaccination programme in North Korea, despite previous offers of supplies from China and COVAX, a global initiative which aims to provide equitable access to COVID vaccines.

The government has previously turned down three million Sinovac doses from China, along with shipments of the AstraZeneca vaccine, the latter reportedly due to concerns around side effects.

Now, South Korea has offered

to donate vaccine doses, but North Korea is yet to accept. To some extent, North Korea is in the same position the rest of the world was in early to mid 2020.

The government has ordered a national lockdown. This will have socio-economic consequences for residents but, overall, is probably a sensible move, given the population will have little immunity against the virus, whether through prior infection or the safer route of vaccination.

Kim Jong-un has also or-

dered the army to distribute medicines and supplies, while criticising officials and the public health sector for what he has deemed an inadequate pandemic response.

The healthcare system in North Korea is reported to be fragile, especially away from the capital city of Pyongyang.

An outbreak could easily overwhelm the health facilities in some areas. This would have a knock-on effect to other areas of healthcare, further limiting access to care for non-communicable diseases, for example.

A lockdown will at least buy the country some time to implement other public health measures, such as vaccination campaigns. It is thought that North Korea has a lower prevalence of some of the conditions which we know increase the risk of severe COVID, such as obesity, compared with many other Asia and Pacific countries.

However, more than ten million people in North Korea are considered to be food insecure (where having access to suffi-

cient safe and nutritious food is not guaranteed). And we know malnutrition increases the risk of severe disease with COVID.

Another factor which increases risk is older age. An estimated 10 per cent of the population in North Korea is aged 65 or over, and roughly another 19 per cent aged between 50 and 64. So there are a large number of people who may be vulnerable to severe illness if they contract COVID.

How will things play out? New variants of concern may emerge from this outbreak, though given the lack of contact with the rest of the world, they may not be easily exported.

There have been several humanitarian catastrophes related to uncontrolled COVID outbreaks, perhaps most notably in India, where it is likely that hundreds of thousands, if not millions, died in just a few months.

With uncontrolled outbreaks on such a large scale, the true death tolls can only ever be estimated. The situation in

North Korea threatens a similar humanitarian catastrophe. We know infection numbers can get very large very quickly, particularly with omicron being even more infectious than previous variants.

Routine datasets, such as death registers and certificates indicating cause of death, are likely to be limited and of low quality. Public reporting may be non-existent, and if surveillance data is revealed, the accuracy of the findings should be given very careful consideration. This COVID outbreak is likely to create a high burden of disease in North Korea, putting huge pressures on the health system. The population will undoubtedly suffer greatly, whether or not public reporting of health outcomes shows the full fallout.

There is an urgent need for widespread COVID vaccination, particularly of older and vulnerable people. Now would be a very good time for North Korea to overcome its usual suspicion of the outside world, and accept international offers of help.

Wrestler Satender Malik assaults referee Jagbir Singh during CWG trials, gets life ban



NEW DELHI: In an unprecedented incident, Services' wrestler Satender Malik launched a physical assault on referee Jagbir Singh after losing the 125kg final during the Commonwealth Games trials, prompting the national federation to impose a life ban on him, here on Tuesday. The Air Force wrestler was leading 3-0 with just a 18 seconds left in the deciding bout when Mohit effected a 'take-down' move and also pushed Satender out of the mat for another point. However, referee Virender Malik did not award two points to Mohit for the 'take-down' move and gave only one point for the pushout. The decision upset Mohit, who requested for a challenge. Satyadev Malik, the jury for the bout, excused himself from the decision for the sake of im-

partiality, since he belonged to the Mokhra village from where Satender also comes.

Senior referee Jagbir Singh was requested to look into the challenge and with the help of TV replays, he ruled that Mohit should be given three points. The score became 3-3 and remained like that till the end, and eventually Mohit was declared winner on criteria since he had scored the last point of the bout. Satender lost his cool, walked across to Mat A where Ravi Dahiya and Aman were locked in the 57kg final, went straight to Jagbir, and began to assault him.

He first abused Jagbir and then slapped him, who lost his balance and fell on the ground. The 57kg bout was stopped as the incident created a furore inside the KD Jadhav hall at the IG stadium. Hundreds of fans, officials and participants were shocked to witness a scene like that. Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) officials managed to send Satender out of the hall and restarted the bout. Everything was happening right before the eyes of WFI President Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh, who was sitting on the dias. "We have imposed life ban on Satender Malik. The decision was taken by WFI President," WFI's assistant secretary Vinod Tomar told PTI. "The referees officiating that bout will also be called for an explanation that why points were not awarded to Mohit when it was clear that the take-down move was clean. Why did they let the situation go out of hand." A visibly shaken Jagbir Singh said, "I had no inkling that he would do something like that." A Class One referee since 2013, Jagbir added, "I had nothing to do with this bout. I had officiated the 97kg and 65kg finals and gave the ruling only after I was asked to do it." "It's up to WFI what action it wants to take against him." Satyadev Malik said, "I wanted to stay away from the decision making since we live close by. In international wrestling also, if the wrestler is from India, a jury from India can't officiate that bout."

AR Rahman in Cannes market with two films



The opening night party of Marche du Film Festival de Cannes, co-hosted by country of honour India, unleashed late night fireworks that lit up the Cannes sky. In the course of the next week, several Indian films will be hoping for prospects just as bright and impactful. Among the Indian films being showcased in the Cannes Film Market, is two-time Oscar-winning music composer A.R. Rahman's directorial debut "Le Musk". The film is premiering in the market's XR programme. Based on an idea from Rahman's wife Saira, the film is a sensory experience that employs haptics, aroma and motion. I am in the marketplace, the composer-turned-film director joked outside the India Pavilion in the festival's International Village. He indeed is. A Tamil film Iravin Nizhal for which he scored the music is also playing in the Cannes Film Market this year. "Le Musk", a 36-minute English-language drama that revolves around an heiress and musician who, two decades after being orphaned, goes in search of the men who changed her life. In her quest, she banks upon the memory of smell. Because of the complex technology involved in its making,

"Le Musk" took more than five years to come to fruition. The cast of the film is led by French actress and singer Nora Arnezeder, who plays the protagonist. The film, which has to be seen from specially designed chairs, was originally meant to be a 75-minute film but has been trimmed to half of that to sharpen its crucial sensory qualities. Besides Rahman and the six films -- "Rocketry: The Nambi Effect", "Godavari", "Alpha Beta Gamma", "Boomba Ride", "Dhuin", "Tree Full of Parrots" -- selected by the Information and Broadcasting Ministry to represent India in the ever-busy Marche du Film, several directors from the country, most of them first-timers, are in the Market with new films or projects. Declaring that the "land of storytellers," in the "spotlight of the cinematic world today," is "ready to engage and collaborate," the minister reiterated: "We will take all the necessary measures to speed up co-production collaborations from around the world and also offer the best locations and historical locations in India for film shoots."

IIFA Awards advanced to June first week

MUMBAI: Days after the International Indian Film Academy postponed the 22nd edition of the IIFA Weekend and Awards to July, the organisers announced that the three-day extravaganza will now kick off on June 2. The annual gala was previously scheduled to be held in May at Yas Island, Abu Dhabi but was later delayed to July after the UAE declared a 40-day mourning period following the demise of UAE President and ruler of Abu Dhabi Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Al Nahyan.

In a press statement issued on Tuesday night, the International Indian Film Academy announced the new date of the awards ceremony. "Uniting the world to showcase cinematic excellence, IIFA is pleased to confirm the final new dates of June 2 to 4, 2022 (and not in July as our previous communication mentioned)," the organisers said in a statement. Bollywood superstar Salman Khan and actor Riteish Deshmukh will host the much anticipated event, which will see performances by cine personalities, including Ranveer Singh, Kartik Aaryan, Varun Dhawan, Sara Ali Khan, Ananya Panday, Divya Khosla Kumar and Nora Fatehi. The event will take place at Ethad Arena, part of Yas Bay Waterfront on Yas Island, Abu Dhabi, in collaboration with the Department of Culture and Tourism Abu Dhabi (DCT Abu Dhabi), and Miral.

Hrishikesh Mukherjee's 'Anand' to get a remake

Over 50 years after its release, Hrishikesh Mukherjee's cult classic "Anand" is headed for a remake. Sameer Raj Sippy, grandson of N C Sippy, the producer of the 1971 hit, is working on a new version of the film along with producer Vikram Khakhar. Regarded as one of the finest films in Hindi cinema, Mukherjee's "Anand" featured the late superstar Rajesh Khanna in the title role of a terminally ill cancer patient and megastar Amitabh Bachchan as Dr Bhaskar, fondly called 'Babumoshai' by Khanna's character. According to the makers, the project is in the scripting stage and a director is yet to be finalised. Sameer Raj Sippy said stories like "Anand" need to be narrated



to the new generation. "Keeping in mind the sensibilities of the original film and the emotions attached, I felt the current generation needs to be retold the many stories that are so relevant today and especially when there is a great appetite for good content," the producer said in a statement on Thursday. Khakhar, who has produced films such as "Main Aur Charles", said the COVID-19 pandemic has made people more aware about the fickle nature of life and the story of "Anand", originally co-written by Mukherjee, Bimal Dutt, D N Mukherjee and Gulzar, will resonate with them.

Umran will be a great bowler for India says Chaminda Vaas

Former Sri Lankan pacer Chaminda Vaas reckons rookie speedster Umran Malik, who has thrilled everyone with his pace in the IPL, will become a "great bowler" for India. Playing for the Sunrisers Hyderabad in IPL-15, the fast bowler from Jammu has been impressive with his pace and consistently clocked above 150 kmph in the speed gun. He has so far taken 21 wickets, with best figures of 5/25 and is the



fourth highest wicket-taker in the tournament. "I think he (Umran) is getting better day by day and I saw him

playing in the last IPL as well. He is bowling consistently and accuracy is important when it comes to T20. And he will be a great bowler for India. He will be there with (Jaspri) Bumrah, I guess if India gives him a chance. He will go a long way," Vaas told reporters here. The ex-left-arm seamer, who has 355 wickets in 111 Tests, is in the city to coach children of the 'Mumbai Cricket Club' led by coach Jwala Singh.

KKR will invest in Rinku in coming years, says McCullum

Kolkata Knight Riders head coach Brendon McCullum says young batter Rinku Singh has been their find of the ongoing IPL season and the franchise will invest in him in the coming years. Rinku, who nearly pulled off an epic win with his breathtaking batting against Lucknow Super Giants here on Wednesday, earned high praise from McCullum. "Absolutely he (Rinku) sure has (been the find of the season). Fouzia Azeem, better known by her stage name Qandeel Baloch, was a model, actress, social media celebrity and activist. She rose to prominence due to her videos on social networks discussing her daily routine, her rights as a Pakistani woman, and various controversial issues. She was strangled to death by her brother Muhammad Wasem.
