PUNJAB CHIEF MINISTER ANNOUNCES TO GIVE MAJOR PUSH TO AGRICULTURE ALLIED ACTIVITIES IN STATE



Punjab Govt to launch inquiry into anti national activities of 'Waris Punjab De'

NEWDELHI: Punjab government has decided to order an inquiry into the pro-Khalistan activities of Amritpal Singh, president of Waris Punjab De (WPD) organisation which was floated by a controversial actor-turned-activist late Deep Sidhu.

Punjab Finance Minister Harpal Cheema, who is number two in the state cabinet, said today that strict action would be taken against Amritpal Singh for anti-national speeches and activities.

Harpal Cheema was asked by reporters what the government was doing in response to the hatred being spread amongst the communities by Amritpal who openly challenged the «hakumat» and called the Sikh youths to «fight for azaadi».

Punjab Finance Minister's statement comes on a day when Amritpal Singh addressed a well-attended congregation in Rode, the native village of extremist Sikh leader late Jarnail Singh Bhindranwale.



Amritpal in his vitriolic speech openly criticised «Dilli hakumat» (Central government) for pushing «bhaiyas» from Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Uttarakhand, and Himachal to outnumber Sikhs in Punjab. These «bhaiyas» were openly smoking and using tobacco on the land of Sikh Gurus violating the tenets of «our religion».

He said, «I will follow the path shown by Mahapurkh Bhindranwale and fight for «azaadi» of Punjab from the tyranny of the «zaalim hakumat».

He called upon the Sikhs to

been trying to decimate the identity of the «martial race».

He elaborated that after Guru Nanak refused to wear a «janeu» (Hindu religious thread) since then the Sikhs became an eyesore for the «other community» He then went on to mention Operation Blue Star and the 1984 anti-Sikh pogrom.

Addressing a large gathering in a village in Hoshiarpur, Amritpal said, «we are being forced by the ruling class to hoist «tiranga» (tricolour) on our roof-tops though the «Panth» has its very own Kesri» flag inherited from Guru Gobind Singh and Maharaja Ranjit Singh.»

The WPD is also recruiting «marjiwade» (suicide squads) in large numbers from all over Punjab, who will always be ready to lay down their lives for the «Sangat» whenever called upon to do so.

The founder of WPD, Deep Sidhu was the key accused in the violent incidents of January 26th, 2021 when during

the farmers' protest in Delhi, a «Kesri» flag was hoisted alongside the national flag on Red Fort. He was later arrested and released from Tihar jail of Delhi on bail after several days. He died early this year in a road accident in Haryana while travelling with his US-based girlfriend, Reena Rai.

Highly-placed Punjab police sources when contacted said that Dubai-based Amritpal Singh was being propped up by the ISI of Pakistan as a substitute for Bhindranwale.

Sangrur MP Simranjit Singh Mann is extending full support to the activities of Amritpal asking people to participate in the latter's congregations where youths are baptised.

A staunch critic of the radicals and the Khalistan movement, New Zealand-based TV and radio host Harnet Singh Neki warned that the actions of WPD, if not nipped in the bud, would once again put Punjab back to the dark days of bloodshed.

Rs.204 crore released for salary of mid-day meal workers: Harjot Singh Bains

CHANDIGARH: Punjab Government has released Rs.204 crores for the salary of the mid-day meal workers of government schools and the salary would be credited in their bank accounts within next 2-3 days, informed Harjot Singh Bains, Minister of School Education, Punjab in a press communique issued here today.

S. Bains said, «when I was visiting Government Senior Secondary School (Girls) Sri Anandpur Sahib, Government Senior Secondary School (Boys) Nangal and Government High School Dasgrai today, mid-day meal workers brought to my notice that they haven't received salary for the last three months. On enquiry it was found that the salary was pending at the end of the Finance Department.

The School Education Minister said that he immediately met the Finance Minister Harpal Singh Cheema for resolving this issue at the earliest.

GST revenue in September likely at Rs 1.45 lakh cr



Goods and Services Tax (GST) revenue mop-up in September is expected to be around Rs 1.45 lakh crore, an official said.

The collection has been over Rs 1.4 lakh crore since March and in August it was Rs 1.43 lakh crore.

«The collection in September is likely to be little more than Rs 1.45 lakh crore. Improved business activity is expected to yield better collections in coming months,» the official said. Official revenue figures will

be released on October 1. The mop-up in September last year was Rs 1.17 lakh crore.

The official further said as per estimates, the average yearly revenue from GST in 2022-23 is expected to be around Rs 1.55 lakh crore.

The collection in April was at a record high of Rs 1.68 lakh crore. In May, GST revenue was Rs 1.41 lakh crore, in June Rs 1.44 lakh crore, Rs 1.49 lakh crore (July) and Rs 1.43 lakh crore (August).

Kharge, Tharoor and Tripathi filed nominations on the last day which saw the AICC headquarters come back to life after long, with workers swarming the complex.

Veteran actor Asha Parekh was on Friday honoured with the Dada Saheb Phalke award, the highest recognition in the field of Indian cinema. Asha Parekh, 79, was presented the award by President Droupadi Murmu during the 68th National Film Awards ceremony, held at Vigyan Bhawan here. The veteran said she is grateful to receive the prestigious award a day before her 80th birthday.

BSF seized 2 packets of Heroin at Indo-Pak border



Border security Force here today have seized two packets of heroin with a gross weight 2.180 kgs.

In a statement issued here, BSF official stated that on today during afternoon hours, forward deployed BSF troops noticed something suspicious items lying in the farming field in the area falling near village - Bhopal, under Amritsar district. Further, during search of the area, BSF troops recovered two packets of narcotics substance suspected to be Heroin (gross wt. - 2.180 kgs), wrapped in yellow adhesive tape.

President Droupadi Murmu Inaugurates Historic World Famous Mysore Dussehra Festival in Mysore

President Droupadi Murmu inaugurated the Historic world famous Mysore Dussehra festival on Monday by offering a special puja to Goddess Chamundeswari at Chamundi hill. This is the first time that the President inaugurated the Dussehra festival and her first visit to the state as the president of India. The festival begins on the first day of Navratri with nightly pujas and ends with the Jambusawari procession on the day of Vijaydashami.

Earlier Karnataka chief minister Basavaraj Bommai along with Karnataka Governor Thawar Chand Gehlot welcomed president Murmu at the Mysuru airport and felicitated her. After formal light lamping ceremony at Chamundi Hills, Droupadi Murmu inaugurated the 10-day Mysuru Dasara festival. Like every dussehra the streets of Mysuru were already lit up with colourful lights as the city is going to witness a grand festival celebration for the next few days. Starting from Monday, the celebrations will go on till October 5. Lakhs of tourists expected to visit Mysuru this year to experience the grand



celebrations.

According to the statement issued by Rashtrapati Bhavan, the president will attend a felicitation function, 'Poura Sanmana', which will be organised by the Hubli-Dharwad Municipal Corporation in Hubli. She will later inaugurate the new campus of the Indian Institute of Information Technology in Dharwad.

According to HAL statement President Droupadi Murmu will Inaugurate HAL's State-of-art integrated Cryogenic Engine Manufacturing Facility (ICMF) on Tuesday. This facility will

cater to the entire Rocket Engine Manufacturing under one roof for ISRO and boost self-reliance in manufacturing of high-thrust rocket engines. The facility is set up over and area of 4500 sq mts housing over 70 hit-tech equipment and testing facilities for manufacturing Cryogenic (CE20) and Semi-cryogenic (SE2000) Engines of Indian Space Launch Vehicles.

Dussehra festival will be held for starting from Monday till October 5 and For this Rs. 36 crores has been allocated by the Karnataka government according to sources.

Ghulam Nabi Azad launches Democratic Azad Party in J&K



JAMMU: Ghulam Nabi Azad, who recently parted ways with the Congress, on Monday launched his new party -- the Democratic Azad party (DAP).

The former Jammu and Kashmir chief minister had ended his more than five-decade-long association with the Congress on August 26.

«I am launching Democratic Azad Party (DAP) from here today. It symbolises democracy and freedom of speech and thought. Our ideology will be based on the ideals of Mahatma Gandhi,» Azad said during a press conference here.

Azad said the DAP will have «no competition» with any other political party and it will focus on «strengthening» peace and normalcy in Jammu and Kashmir. Over two dozen prominent Congress leaders, including former deputy chief minister Tara Chand, had resigned from the Congress in support of Azad.

Centre govt should file review petition in Supreme Court against HSGMC Act, 2014 : Dhami

Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee President Harjinder Singh Dhami on Thursday wrote a letter to Home Minister of India, Amit Shah, demanding that the Government of India should file a review petition against the Supreme Court judgment upholding validity of Haryana Sikh Gurdwara (Management) Act, 2014.

In his letter to the Home Minister, SGPC President said that the right to make any amendment in the Sikh Gurdwaras Act, 1925, with recommendations of SGPC, is only with the Government of India, according to which, the state governments cannot make any interference in this Act of 1925. He said the Act passed by the Haryana government for establishing a separate Gurdwara management for the state is unconstitutional and its validity should be cancelled immediately.

He demanded that the Government of India should file a review petition and should immediately pass an ordinance in the Parliament to undo the



effects of HSGMC, Act, 2014. He said that the SGPC came into existence before independence after great sacrifices and with its foundation, the path for India's independence was rooted. Any act of breaking this constitutional organisation will not be accepted at any cost.

Notably, SGPC in its executive committee meeting on September 23, 2022, at Chandigarh has also decided to file a review petition against the Supreme Court judgment (related to HSGMC Act, 2014) dated September 20, 2022.

He said that the Supreme Court's validation of the HSGMC Act, 2014, has affected the SGPC greatly and with this judgment, Haryana

Sikhs have been separated from the central Sikh body. He said that with this decision, the Sikh community is feeling divided and it is directly looking at biased and politically motivated judgment.

Meanwhile, he has termed the support to HSGMC Act by some Sikh leaders of Haryana and those related to BJP as creating divisions among the Sikh community.

He said a BJP leader sitting on a constitutional post is advocating for the All India Sikh Gurdwaras Act, while he is silent on direct interference in the Sikh Gurdwaras Act, 1925, by establishing a separate Haryana Gurdwara Committee. He said it is a dual policy, which is being adopted deliberately to create doubts in the community.

SGPC President questioned whether these leaders can answer that a state government can make any amendment or interfere in the jurisdiction of the Sikh Gurdwaras Act, 1925? He said the SGPC is also in favour of the All India Sikh Gurdwaras Act, but it can never accept that jurisdiction of SGPC, established after great sacrifices, is affected.

Govt bans PFI, associates for alleged terror activities

Popular Front of India (PFI), which has allegedly been involved in a series of violence and has «links» with global terror groups like ISIS, has been banned by the Centre along with its several associates for five years following the second round of crackdown against its leaders.

The organisations which were also declared banned under the stringent anti-terror law UAPA include Rehab India Foundation (RIF), Campus Front of India (CF), All India Imams Council (AIC), National Confederation of Human Rights Organisation (NCHRO), National Women's Front, Junior Front, Empower India Foundation and Rehab Foundation, Kerala.

More than 150 people allegedly linked with PFI were detained or arrested in raids across seven states on Tuesday, five days after a similar pan-India crackdown against the 16-year-old group had led to the arrest of over a hundred of its activities and seizure of several dozen properties.

In a late Tuesday night notification, the Union Home Ministry said some of the PFI's founding members are the leaders of the Students Islamic Movement of



India (SIMI) and the PFI has linkages with Jamat-ul-Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB). Both JMB and SIMI are proscribed organisations. It said there had been many instances of international linkages of PFI with global terrorist groups such as the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria (ISIS).

The PFI and its associates or affiliates or fronts have been working covertly to increase the radicalisation of one community by promoting a sense of insecurity in the country, which is substantiated by the fact that some PFI cadres have joined international terrorist organisations, the notification claimed

«Whereas, the Central government, having regard to the above circumstances, is of the firm opinion that it is necessary to declare the PFI and its associates or affiliates or fronts association outlawed with immediate effect, and accordingly, in exercise of the powers conferred by the proviso to sub-section (3) of section 3 of the said Act, declares it as outlawed,» it said.

The Home Ministry said Uttar Pradesh, Karnataka and Gujarat governments had also recommended a ban on PFI.

It claimed that PFI and its associates or affiliates or fronts have been involved in violent terrorist activities with an intent

PFI's Twitter handle taken down

Twitter handle of the Popular Front of India (PFI) was taken down on Thursday, a day after the group was banned by the government for five years for allegedly having «links» with global terror organisations like the ISIS and trying to spread communal hatred in the country.

«Account Withheld. @PFIOfficial's account has been withheld in India in response to a legal demand,» a message in the page read.

The PFI was accused of indulging in «disturbing» communal and secular fabric of the country and «posing a grave threat» to the national security by advancing its radical ideology and calling for



establishment of political Islam in India besides allegedly carrying out targeted killings of Hindu activists.

The PFI, the home ministry alleged, is encouraging and trying to enforce a terror-based regressive regime, continue to propagate anti-national sentiments and radicalising a particular section of society to create disaffection against the country, aggravating activities which are detrimental to the integrity, security and sovereignty of the country.

The Chief Minister, while addressing the gathering after dedicating Verka milk plant with capacity of processing one lakh litre milk, said that it is the need of hour to bail out farmer from crisis. He said that due to increasing agriculture inputs and diminishing returns the agriculture is no longer a profitable venture. Bhagwant Mann in such scenario the allied activities can bail out the farmers. He said that this project constructed at cost of Rs 15 crore will give major push to dairy farming sector. Bhagwant Mann said



that besides giving impetus to dairy farming it will also help in checking the supply of spurious milk in state.

The Chief Minister further said that another such plant with capacity six times more than this plant is coming up at a cost of Rs 100 crore in Ludhiana. He said that it will be too dedicated to people soon. Bhagwant Mann said that stringent quality check is also being

introduced in these plants.

The Chief Minister asserted that upgradation of the procurement infrastructure is the need of hour to ensure best quality of milk is collected from villages and then is supplied to consumers after processing. Punjab Assembly passes Bill to empower Vigilance Commission

Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann on Friday moved the Punjab State Vigilance Commission (Repeal) Bill, 2022, that was passed unanimously. Moving a resolution to this regard, Mann said that the main function of the Punjab State Vigilance Commission is to enquire or cause enquires into complaints alleging commission of offences by a public servant under the Prevention of Corruption Act 1988, Prevention of Corruption (Amendment) Act, 2018.

He said the commission is also empowered to exercise superintendence and control over the functioning of the Vigilance



Bureau and police establishment in so far it relates to corruption cases Mann said the Punjab State Vigilance Commission Act 2020, which was supposed to be enacted on the lines of the

Central Vigilance Commission Act 2003, suffers from serious deviations. The Chief Minister said the Vigilance Commission constituted under this Act is, therefore, not serving any useful objectives except being a burden on the state exchequer. He said as there are multiple agencies in the state to deal with same set stakeholders, including full-fledged Vigilance Department.

Therefore, Mann said to avoid overlapping, contradictory findings, resultant delays and gaps in communication, it has become necessary to repeal the Punjab State Vigilance Commission Act 2020.

Third front merely a bundle of extinguished candles: Anil Vij

The proposal to form a powerful third front in the country in order to face BJP ruling government in the country as well as in most of the states at present recently had a gathering to finalize the same at Fatehabad in Haryana on the eve of birth anniversary of former Deputy Prime Minister Tau Devi Lal by former Haryana chief minister Om Parkash Chautala organized 'Samman Divas' rally inviting leaders of different political parties in opposition in the country. Like in past, no action could be taken by all present leaders as regard formation of a third front in the country except all those present spoke against ruling BJP government in the country as well as in majority of states.

favor of BJP candidates in maximum number of seats in these elections.

Pointing at recent tug and war for power going on in Rajasthan Vij said that Ashok Gehlot has remained unsuccessful to control only Rajasthan state, how he will be able to control entire country, raising a question Vij said though it is an internal matter related to Congress party but it clearly shows that Congress lacks democracy in party, wants to impose things on others lacking system in their party by having secret voting even to select their party leader or president. Talking to media persons Vij said, 'Bharat Jodo' rally being organized by Congress at present is merely a eye wash, whereas it will break country since breaking country is in Congress DNA.

Vij said, it is only due to Congress that countless innocent people in the country were killed during partition in the country and we cannot forget how more than 3500 persons belonging to Sikhs community were brutally killed in the country during Sikh riots in 1984 only due to Congress. Vij said that leaders of opposition in Haryana Vidhan Sabha had imposed several false allegations on ruling BJP government in Haryana which included that nearly 5000 educational schools in Haryana state has been closed down by the government in the state, but Hooda should at least tell the names of these schools since he is in the habit of making false allegations and lies.

Police arrest one more accused in the case of Amritsar IED

The Amritsar police have nabbed the key accused Yuvraj Sabharwal resident of Gali Ghumira vali, Navi Abadi Faizpura, Amritsar from Kullu, Himachal Pradesh who had planted IED under the Bolero Car of Punjab Police Sub Inspector Dilbagh Singh in the posh Ranjit Avenue Locality.

Deputy Commissioner of Police Mukhwinder Singh Bhullar, said that the arrested accused Yuvraj Sabharwal was the main kingpin of this case, who executed the operation on directions of Lakhbir @ Landa.

Police said that two pistols, five cartridges, one detonator,



some packaging material, remains of explosive substance were seized from Yuvraj Sabharwal during the course of investigation after his arrest.

On the intervening night of 15/16 August 2022, he along with his accomplice Deepak (already arrested and lodged in Amritsar Central Jail) retrieved I.E.D. from village Khan Kot, Amritsar and planted it under

the Bolero Car of Punjab Police Sub Inspector Dilbagh Singh. So far eight accused have been arrested in the I.E.D. case including the aforesaid Yuvraj.

Police said that accused Yuvraj Sabharwal was presently facing eleven FIRs registered in the different police stations of Amritsar, Batala, Bholath in Kapurthala and Tarn Taran in murder, dacoity, arms and ammunition, threatening under sections of 302, 336,323,324,506,148,149, 45,427, 379 and 395 of IPC.

On his further interrogation he confessed that Ashok Kumar and Gurcharan Singh of Garbhaga of PS. Noorpur Bedi District Ropar gives them shelter after installing IED in Amritsar, said police.

Wanted shooter of Bambiha gang arrested by Punjab Police

CHANDIGARH: Punjab Police have arrested Neeraj (Chaska), the top-most wanted shooter of the Davinder Bambiha gang, for his involvement in multiple murders, including the murder of student leader Gurlal Brar, Director General of Police Gaurav Yadav said here on Thursday.

The murder of Brar, who was a close relative of Canada-based gangster Goldy Brar, has triggered an inter-gang rivalry between the Davinder Bambiha gang and the Lawrence Bishnoi gang, leading to a spate of murders in Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh and the National Capital Region (NCR) Delhi.

Brar was shot dead outside



a nightclub in Chandigarh in October 2020.

The arrested gangster Neeraj, a.k.a. Chaska, who is resident of Jaito in Faridkot, is the main shooter of Bambiha gang, being controlled by foreign-based wanted gangster Gaurav, a.k.a. Lucky Patial, who is the main handler of Bambiha gang after gangster Davinder Bambiha was neutralized by Punjab Police in September 2016.

Four shooters of Happy Jatt group land in Police net

Four members of Happy Jatt gang were arrested by Police in a special operation led by teams of Crime Branch and Jandiala Police.

Addressing the press conference here today SSP Amritsar (Rural) Swapan Sharma said that three pistols of 32 bore, one pistol of 30 bore and a get-away vehicle were recovered from them. He said that 16 Criminal cases were registered against the arrested.

Those arrested are involved in organised extortion, armed dacoity, murder and arms-contra-band smuggling. The seized weapons have their origin in Indore, M.P., said the SSP.

since most of the structures have been found constructed at illegal places either on government or encroached land or built by anti-social elements. According to information, large number of illegal buildings has already been demolished in recent past on war footing basis.

Among those include in the list of 89 persons include large number of drug smugglers including few females involved in this illicit business as well as anti-social elements and decision has already been taken to demolish their resi-

dential as well as commercial buildings at an early which include 20 persons at Rohtak, 18 persons at Hisar, 11 persons at Fatehabad, 8 persons at Jind, 8 persons at Sirsa, 7 persons each at Kurukshetra and Jhajjar, 5 persons at Ambala, 3 persons each at Karnal and Kaithal and one persons at Yamunanagar.

Recently, illegal residential buildings of drug smugglers and antisocial elements have been demolished jointly by police and municipal offices at Rohtak, Hisar, Karnal and Ambala Cantt which were built illegally without giving a notices and similar action awaited in large number of towns for which a list has already been prepared. Sources reveal a sword is hanging over as many as 20 persons allegedly involved in illicit activities only a Rohtak and preparations are being made to demolish their residential buildings with bulldozers any time without serving notice since all these structures have been built illegally.

Sri Darbar Sahib to the office of Deputy Commissioner, Amritsar, and hand over a memorandum against interference in Sikh affairs by Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh and HSGMC Act, on October 4, 2022. Another call has been given to organise a march for awareness among Sikh Sangat on this issue from Takht Sri Damdama Sahib, Talwandi Sabo and Takht Sri Kesgarh Sahib, Anandpur Sahib, to Akal Takht Sahib.

It was also decided that with the support of Haryana Sikh Sangat, Haryana Chief Minister Manohar Lal Khattar will be confronted and if the govern-

ment still does not awaken, then SGPC members will hold strong protests in Delhi too.

Adopting an aggressive stand against the governments, the speakers including SGPC President Advocate Harjinder Singh Dhami said that for the safety of the Supreme Sikh body SGPC, the entire Khalsa Panth will struggle with unity under the leadership of Akal Takht Sahib. 'Operation Bulldozer' intensifies, Police nabbed Nigerian drug supplier

CIA Staff Ambala police arrested a Nigerian wholesale drugs supplier identified as Martin used to supply drugs in bulk in the area contacting customers through network on Watts up, CIA Staff Ambala police arrested Martin during a raid at Delhi two days ago and brought him to Ambala. Martin was produced in the court at Ambala on September 29 and remanded to police custody for four days. Ambala police reached up to Nigerian drugs supplier through a youth Deepak arrested by Ambala police along with another companion on October 18, 2022 carrying heroine during search operation on the national highway near Shastri Colony Ambala Cantt when he disclosed the identity of drug supplier Martin. Inspector Virender during raid arrested the accused.

Haryana Chief Minister Manohar Lal Khattar's 'Operation Bulldozer' introduced in the state bringing good results when most of the drug suppliers playing with the life of innocent people in-



cluding youths in the state are now thinking to migrate from Haryana state to neighboring states. Apart from demolishing the properties of drug smugglers and hard core criminals in Haryana state government has now decided to attach their properties in order to wipe them out of state completely.

In past couple of days Haryana state government accompanied by police force has demolished 25 constructions in a complex at fish market in sector 22 Faridabad spread in 2.5 acre area which was

encroached by a criminal family led by Vijender alias Lala against whom 32 criminal cases including murder, drugs and illicit liquor smuggling were registered by the police at different police stations who died last year and the entire business was being presently controlled by deceased's family. Police demolished all 25 structures illegally constructed over land originally belonging to government which included three residential buildings, nearly 18 shops, three godowns and an office.

Mallikarjun Kharge, a Gandhi family loyalist poised to be 2nd Congress president from Karnataka



In 1969, he joined the Indian National Congress and went on to become president of the Gulbarga City Congress Committee. That Kharge was unconquerable at the hustings was mirrored until 2014 Lok Sabha polls in which he bucked the Narendra Modi wave that swept Karnataka, particularly Hyderabad-Karnataka region, and had won from Gulbarga with a margin of over 74,000 votes.

He has won from Gurnitkal Assembly constituency nine times in a row before he plunged into the Lok Sabha poll arena in 2009 and has been a two-time MP from Gulbarga parliamentary segment. However, in the 2019 Lok Sabha polls the veteran leader was defeated by BJP's Umesh Jadhav in Gulbarga by a margin of 95,452 votes. That was the first electoral loss in Kharge's political life spanning several decades.

Popularly known as "Solilada Saradara" (a leader without defeat) in his home-State of Karnataka Mapanna Mallikarjun Kharge, who on Friday filed nomination for the Congress' presidential polls, is a hardcore loyalist of the Gandhi family. If elected, he will be the second AICC president from Karnataka after S Nijalingappa,

and also a Dalit leader to hold the post after Jagjivan Ram. A leader with more than 50 years of experience in politics, 80-year-old Kharge, who was elected MLA for nine times in a row, has seen a steady rise in his career graph from humble beginnings as a union leader in his home-district of Gulbarga, now Kalaburagi.

Congress intensifies its 'PayCM' campaign against BJP govt in Karnataka

Four more held for PFI links in MP, state home minister says ban on group 'internal surgical strike'



Four more persons have been arrested by the Madhya Pradesh police for their links with the Popular Front of India, taking the number to 25, state Home Minister Narottam Mishra said on Wednesday as he welcomed the ban on the group by the Centre terming it as an "internal surgical strike".

Kerala HC dismisses PIL to regulate Bharat Jodo Yatra



The Kerala High Court on Tuesday dismissed a Public Interest Litigation (PIL) which sought a direction to the state government and the police to ensure the Congress party's ongoing 'Bharat Jodo Yatra' does not create traffic jams by taking over the entire road.

A bench of Chief Justice S Manikumar and Justice Shaji P Chaly rejected the PIL after the Kerala government said

the foot march was going on peacefully and action had been taken where any illegal activity was found.

In view of the state's submissions, the court said that the petitioner, an advocate, was unable to prove his allegation that the march was causing traffic jams.

deducted peacefully. The plea, by advocate Vijayan K, had sought to ensure that the yatra, led by Congress leader and Wayanad MP Rahul Gandhi, only takes up half of the road and leaves the rest for free flow of vehicles.

Besides regulating the march, which began from Kanyakumari in Tamil Nadu on September 7 and intends to cover 3,570 km in 150 days to reach Kashmir, the PIL had also sought directions to recover from the Congress the expenses incurred in the deployment of the huge police force along the yatra route.

It had also arrayed as parties the Congress, Rahul Gandhi, KPCC president K Sudhakaran and Leader of Opposition in the State Assembly V D Sathesnan. It had alleged the three Congress leaders "are having no respect to the law enacted by the central and state governments and the law laid down by the court".

TRP scam spooks again: ED books 16 for money laundering, 'exonerates' Republic TV

Enforcement Directorate (ED) has virtually 'exonerated' Republic TV and R. Bharat - English and Hindi news channels owned by Arnab R. Goswami, but the agency has booked 16 others of various private television channels and a market research group, for alleged money-laundering charges in the sensational TRP scam that erupted two years ago.

The ED charge sheet was filed on September 26 on behalf of Assistant Director Pawan Kumar before the Special PMLA Court Mumbai, and has sought initiation of proceedings, among others, to confiscate the provisionally attached properties of all the accused as stipulated under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act, as they were bought from the proceeds of the crime.

The accused named are: Shirish V. Pattanshetty and Manish R. Sangh, both owners of 'Fakht Marathi' channel, their



company Lotus Enterprises, Narayan N. Sharma, owner of 'Box Cinema' channel and his company Box Cinemedia Pvt. Ltd., Vishwajeet O. Sharma and Darshan B. Singh, both owners of 'Mahamovie' channel and their company Teleone Consumers Product Pvt. Ltd.

The others are: Bompally Rao Mistry of Sanch Media, Umesh C. Mishra, Vishal V. Bhandari, Dinesh P. Vishwakarma, Vikas V. Burungale, Ashwin C. Motiwale, Mahesh S. Bompalli and

Rajesh K. Vishwakarma (all ex-employees of Hansa Research Group), as named in the charge sheet. The ED has urged the Special Court to take cognisance and issue process against all the accused individuals (for arrest), order the confiscation of their movable and immovable assets, seize their passports, etc.

Presumably giving a 'clean chit' to Goswami and his news channels, the ED termed its investigations under PMLA as "at variance" with the probe ini-

tially conducted by the Mumbai Police, as "no such evidence is forthcoming" in the statements of the accused/witnesses, digital data evidence and analysis of the raw data provided by Broadcast Audience Research Council (BARC).

The ED said that the Mumbai Police -- which had first exposed the scam in 2020 -- relied on a forensic audit report of Acquisitory Risk Consulting Pvt. Ltd., that contended how the TRP calculation methodology was tinkered with and controls used to favour specific channels, was superficial and based on analysis of limited aspects.

The Mumbai Police had named Republic TV, India Today and other channels as allegedly involved in the TRP scam that had shaken up the country's media industry and sparked a massive political uproar.

In view of its findings, the ED charge sheet has not mentioned Republic TV, R. Bharat

channels, its Editor-in-Chief Goswami or his company ARG Outlier Media, or any BARC officials. However, the ED probe has detected instances of TRP manipulations not only in Mumbai and Maharashtra but also Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Karnataka, Assam, Telangana, Andhra Pradesh, and has called for the FIRs filed by the respective state police for investigations. Another FIR was registered by the Uttar Pradesh Police, which has now been transferred and under probe by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI), Delhi.

"From the investigations and evidence gathered, it is clearly established that the (16) accused committed the offence of money laundering... and are liable to be prosecuted and punished... and the provisionally attached properties involved in the money-laundering are liable to be confiscated... as per the PMLA," the ED concluded.



Privacy must be a priority while regulating apps

The draft telecommunication Bill, put out last week for public comments, hints at a disturbing governmental pursuit, for more control over a range of digital applications and over-the-top streaming services that millions of Indians use daily. It seeks to do this by bringing them under the ambit of telecommunication services, the operation of which would require a licence — that is if the draft provisions do go through. This means the likes of WhatsApp, Zoom, and Netflix will be considered telecommunication services. And so would a whole range of digital services that are anyway regulated by the IT Act. This, the Government wants to do, by a wide expansion of the definition of what constitutes a telecom service. The new definition includes everything from broadcasting services to electronic mail, from voice mail to voice, video and data communication services, from Internet and broadband services to over-the-top communication services, including those that the Government may notify separately. It is all well to state, as the Government has done, that the country requires a new legal framework, and not the existing one that is based on the Indian Telegraph Act, 1885, to deal with the realities of the 21st century. But, it is not just technology that has evolved in over a century but also a democratic society's understanding and expectations of user rights, privacy and transparency. Even as one shouldn't underplay the mounting challenges for ensuring security, the repeated attempts by the Government to be able to tap into all kinds of communication, without making sure the common man has a legal armor in the form of a data protection law, is extremely problematic. The Government needs to upgrade its thinking on users and privacy. This draft needs to go back to the drawing board.

INDIA SLIPS A RANK IN UNITED NATION HUMAN DEVELOPMENT INDEX 2021-22

UN: Human Development Index 2021-22 and India

The Human Development Report 2021-22, brought out by the United Nations Development Programme, shows that India's global rankings have slipped from 130 in 2020 to 132 in 2021 in line with a global fall in HDI scores in the wake of the pandemic Covid-19. At 73 and with an index value of 0.782, Sri Lanka emerged as the best performer in the Indian sub-continent. The island nation was followed by China (79 and 0.768), Bhutan (127 and 0.666), Bangladesh (129 and 0.661), India, Nepal (143 and 0.602) and Pakistan (161 and 0.544).

India's HDI value stood at 0.633 in 2021, which was lower than the world average of 0.732. In 2020, too, India recorded a decline in its HDI value (0.642) in comparison to the pre-Covid level of 2019 (0.645). This is not surprising as the growth in India's Human Development Index (HDI) values have decelerated faster than the global values during the pandemic. India's HDI values, which were stagnant in 2019, fell marginally in 2020—the first year of the pandemic—and the fall accelerated almost threefold to -1.4% in 2021. However, at the global level, the fall in HDI indicators was curtailed in 2021 at 0.4%, which is marginally lower than in 2020. This sharp deterioration in India's HDI values by implication tends to have a declining impact on that of both South Asia and medium HDI countries, which include India. The regional numbers show that the highest decline in HDI values in 2021 was in South Asia (0.9%) primarily on account of India's poor performance. Among India's neighboring countries, Sri Lanka (73), China (79), Bangladesh (129) and Bhutan (127) have fared better than India. Only Pakistan



(161), Myanmar (149) and Nepal (143) were worse off.

The highest improvement in HDI values was in Europe and Central Asia, East Asia and the Pacific, where it registered some marginal growth. However, while the HDI values in the Arab countries remained stagnant, they continued to fall in Latin America and the Caribbean.

The World Inequality Report 2022 says the world's most extreme inequality has been observed in India. It notes India is a "poor country and very unequal, with an affluent elite". The WIR says the top 10 per cent of the country's population account for 57 per cent of the national income, of which 22 per cent is held by the top 1 per cent. While a small section of India's populace enjoys

5-star privileges, for the bottom 50 per cent sustainability of life is still a challenge. This is due to a variety of factors, including but not limited to, loss of job opportunities, an erratic unorganised sector, and rising poverty and inflation. The bottom 50 per cent are earning Rs 53160 and the top ten per cent Rs 1166520, 20 times more.

The Gini (inequality in income distribution) coefficient points to increasing inequality in India. The coefficient in 2014 was 34.4 per cent (100 per cent indicates full inequality and 0 per cent full equality). The coefficient increased to 47.9 per cent in 2018. India is said to be next to Russia in the world in terms of inequality.

The report also suggests that stress, sadness, anger, and worry have increased

over the last decade, reaching record levels. The HDR cautions that "uncertainty, inequality and insecurity go hand in hand with polarization and lack of trust". It finds political volatility becoming reality. Developing countries are entering a divergent social, political and economic period with sharp downside risks for the most vulnerable and regression in gender equality. India's per capita gross domestic product (GDP) increased five times between \$443 in 2000 and \$2014 in 2019. This doesn't mean a uniform rise in income.

A rank loss on the UN Human Development Index is a grave indicator of India's overall social and economic performance that invites investment and global participation. India slipped to 132 from 131 last year, which was 130 in 2015. The UN Human Development Report (HDR) noted slippage in quality of life, attainments to basic schooling, healthcare, job losses, penury, and overall lack of opportunities during the Covid-19 pandemic in many countries.

Major features:

- Life expectancy: In 2021, India's life expectancy at birth was recorded at 67.2 years.
- Schooling: Expected years of schooling at 6.7 years, mean years of schooling at 6.7 years,
- Gross National Income: The gross national income per capita stood at USD 6,590.
- Gender Inequality Index: India has been ranked 122 on the Gender Inequality Index.

ANWAR SADAT EXPLAINS WHY RIPARIAN STATES MUST COMPLY WITH PROCEDURAL DUTIES PURSUANT TO 'NO HARM RULE'

In nature's warning signs, a nudge to riparian states

There has been an increase in the magnitude, the frequency and the intensity of floods in many parts of the world. As an example, nearly a third of Pakistan is experiencing devastation, with a spread of diseases and severe shortage of potable water after intense flooding. In June this year Assam experienced one of its worst floods in living memory which affected over 30 districts. In some districts in Assam and Bihar, flooding is a recurrent feature, and thus a major impediment in ensuring poverty alleviation and meeting Millennium Development Goals.

Flooding is still considered to be a natural phenomenon that cannot be entirely prevented. But it is compounded by the lack of transparency in the sharing of hydrological information and also information relating to activities (such as by one riparian state) that are transboundary in their effect (affecting other riparian states), thus serving as an obstacle in understanding the magnitude of flooding.

In accordance with customary international law, no state has to use its territory in a manner that causes harm to another state while using a shared natural resource; this amounts to saying that there is a binding obligation on all states not to release water to cause floods in another co-sharer of the river water. This obligation gives rise to other procedural norms that support the management of floods, which include notification of planned measures, the exchange of data and information, and also public participation.

The International Court of Justice (ICJ), in the Pulp Mills on the River Uruguay (Argentina vs Uruguay) case (2010), upheld that conducting a transboundary environmental impact assessment (TEIA) of a planned measure or projects on the shared water course is part of customary international law. In fact, the ICJ noted that the acting state must notify the affected party of the results of TEIA to



"enable the notified party to participate in the process of ensuring that the assessment is complete, so that it can then consider the plan and its effects with a full knowledge of the facts".

Closer home, there is the case of China being the upper riparian in the Brahmaputra, which spans India and Bangladesh, enjoying apparent leverage vis-à-vis lower riparian India. During the monsoon, flooding has been the recurrent feature in the last several decades in Assam. India faces other woes in the form of the construction of dams by China. China's excessive water release, as a "dam controller", in violation of customary international law has the potential to exacerbate flooding in Assam in future. India's main concern is that there is no comprehensive sub-basin or all basin-level mechanism to deal with water management of Brahmaputra. Neither India or China are party to the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Non-Navigational Uses of International

Watercourses (UNWC) 1997 or the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE) on the Protection and Use of Transboundary Watercourses and International Lakes 1992 (Water Convention).

The UNWC contains a direct reference to floods, which covers harmful conditions and emergency situations. Article 27 of the Convention says: "Watercourse States shall, individually and, where appropriate, jointly, take all appropriate measures to prevent or mitigate conditions... that may be harmful to other watercourse States, whether resulting from natural causes or human conduct, such as floods or ice conditions, water-borne diseases, siltation, erosion, salt-water intrusion, drought or desertification."

In the absence of any mechanism, India relies on its memorandum of understanding (MoU) with China in 2013 with a view to sharing hydrological information during the flood season (June to September). The MoU does not allow India

access to urbanisation and deforestation activities on the Chinese side of the river basin. With the MoU in the background, India by becoming a party to either the UNWC and the Water Convention could lay the groundwork for a bilateral treaty on the Brahmaputra but subject to the reservation that it should not insist on the insertion of a dispute settlement mechanism provision.

Floods are also a recurrent problem in the Koshi and Gandak river basins that are shared by India and Nepal. The intensity and magnitude of flooding is rising because of heavy seasonal precipitation as well as glacial retreat due to global warming and human-induced stressors such as land use and land cover changes in the river basin area of Nepal (Terai) and Bihar. It is important that the two neighbours view the river basins as single entities, which will help in facilitating an integrated approach for improved basin and flood risk management. The India-Nepal Koshi agreement 1954 (revised in 1966) is aimed at reducing devastating flooding in the river basin. The treaty-based joint bodies have also tried to refine the early warning systems for flood forecasting. In contravention of procedural customary international law obligation, India considers data on transboundary rivers as classified information, which is one of the key challenges in developing cross-border flood warning systems. In light of the cataclysmic floods in Pakistan and the visible effects of climate change, it is important that all riparian states must comply with all the procedural duties pursuant to the no harm rule. They must also think of becoming a party to either the UNWC or the UNECE Water Convention.

'The Many Lives of Mangalampalli Balamuralikrishna': Book tells life story of Carnatic music genius

A new book gives readers an in-depth account of the many lives lived by Mangalampalli Balamuralikrishna — the internationally renowned Carnatic musician from the illustrious musical lineage of composer Saint Tyagaraja.

"The Many Lives of Mangalampalli Balamuralikrishna", written by award-winning author Veejay Sai, is published by Penguin Random House India (PRHI). It will be released on Monday.

Having made a stage debut at the age of seven, Balamuralikrishna was hailed as a child prodigy. From then till the time he passed away, at the age of 86 in 2016, he continued to be in the spotlight, not just for his extraordinary tal-

ent and versatility as a vocalist and multi-instrumentalist, but as a composer, playback singer and even, briefly, as a character actor.

"Here is a story of this musical genius. I say 'a' story and not 'the' story because lives like his can never be covered in one book. There is so much more to the man, his genius and his life. A man who could connect with anyone with a song. A man who could make you feel the highly complicated genre of music he was singing was easy," writes Sai in the book.

"Whoever encountered him had a memorable story to share. That was the effect he left on them. If it wasn't a personal meeting, it was his music that lingered on like an aftertaste," he added.

Balamuralikrishna, who has the rare distinction of composing tunes with 72 Melakarta 'ragas', performed in over 25,000 concerts across the world. He has also invented 'talas' (a traditional rhythmic pattern in classical Indian music) such as 'Trimukhi', 'Panchamukhi', 'Saptamukhi' and 'Navamukhi', among others.

Sai's in-depth research into the late artist's life and work has led

him deep into unseen archival material and across the Carnatic musical landscape.

Fortified by interviews with his family members, disciples and peers, the book, according to the publishers, is a "definitive biography of the musical genius, which is not only a revealing account of the personal traits and facets of an unparalleled genius, but also a portrait of India's classical music world" — a place as much of beauty as of untrammelled egos.

Mangalampalli Balamuralikrishna, the internationally re-

He was a school dropout, a teenage poet and composer, a restless mind, a versatile musician, a polyglot, wordsmith, pioneer and an unparalleled musical genius, and this is the story of the many lives of the iconic maestro. With in-depth research into archival material, fortified by interviews with his family, disciples and peers, Veejay Sai's definitive biography of Balamuralikrishna traces his journey in the world of music, a place of beauty as well as egos.

“Taking India’s digital transformation & connectivity to new heights, Hon’ble PM, @narendramodi, will roll out



5G services in India; at India Mobile Congress; Asia’s largest technology exhibition, “read the screenshot of the tweet (now deleted from the NBM handle).

The event will see participation from telecom gear manufacturers and other industry stakeholders, in the presence of IT Minister Ashwini Vaishnav.

According to sources, the government may showcase some successful 5G testbeds being

run in the country by Reliance Jio, Airtel and Vodafone Idea at the IMC 2022, jointly organised by the Department of Telecommunications (DoT) and the Cellular Operators Association of India (COAI).

During his Independence Day address from the ramparts of the Red Fort, the Prime Minister had said that the 5G services will be launched in India soon.

Vaishnav last month said the government expects 5G services to be rolled out in the country by October 12, and the Centre will make sure that the prices are affordable for the consumers.

Vaishnav said that installations are being done and telecom operations are busy with the seamless rollout of 5G services. The government will ensure that the 5G plans remain affordable for the public, the minister said.

The 5G services will be rolled out in a phased manner and during the first phase, 13 cities are likely to get the 5G internet services.

The cities are Ahmedabad, Bengaluru, Chandigarh, Chennai, Delhi, Gandhinagar, Gurugram, Hyderabad, Jamnagar, Kolkata, Lucknow, Mumbai and Pune.

The draft policy envisages creating more employment, retaining the talent pool, ensuring balanced regional development and giving incentives for sustainable and responsible investments.

Other areas identified for emphasis are hi-tech farming, high value-added rubber products, logistics, medical equipment, nano technology, renewable energy, retail, robotics, tourism & hospitality, 3D printing and marine cluster.

Max Life Insurance Company Ltd. (“Max Life/ “Company”), in partnership with KANTAR, launched the second edition of the ‘India Retirement Index Study’ (IRIS). The survey assesses urban India’s readiness to live a healthy, content, and financially independent retired life. Through

a self-administered digital study*, 3,220 respondents were surveyed across 28 cities comprising 6 metros, 12 Tier I and 10 Tier II cities.

While India’s life expectancy is consistently rising over the years, the survey reveals the underlying preparedness levels for retirement in the country over the last year. At 44, India’s Retirement Index (on a scale 0 to

100) reflects lag in urban India’s action on retirement planning in the one-year period.

Health and financial preparedness stood at 41 and 49 respectively, while emotional preparedness witnessed a significant dip from 62 to 59 indicating increasing dependency on family, friends, and social support during retirement.

world’s air travelers want less air pollution from flights and they are willing to pay a little more for this measure.

Management consulting firm McKinsey & Company conducted a survey in 13 countries in which most air travelers expressed concern about air pollution caused by airplanes. About 5,500 people were consulted in the survey, of which 40 percent agreed to pay 2 percent additional money if the carbon emissions are reduced. In Spain, 60 percent of air passengers expressed their desire to opt for carbon-neutral flights. Not only aircraft, but some trains also add to the air pollution, primarily diesel engine driven trains. In India, 37 percent of trains are still dependent on diesel engines. They cause a lot of pollution, and to reduce this the railway is working towards using biodiesel in the fossil fuel-based engines. The Ministry of Railways plans to completely electrify the railways by the



year 2023, that is, the above 37 percent diesel locomotives should also be replaced by electric locomotives. Diesel engines of freight trains may need a little longer time.

Union Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnav wants that by the year 2030, Indian Railways should be completely transformed into ‘green railways’. Railways set up a solar power plant in Bina, Madhya Pradesh in February this year to generate the power it needs. Similarly, wind power plants are being planned in Rajast-

han, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, and Gujarat. There is a plan to illuminate railway buildings and premises with LED bulbs for lighting, so as to save electricity and contribute towards environmental protection. The trend of electric vehicles has already begun, which will help in controlling pollution. Japanese companies like Honda have been the world leaders in automobiles, but over the years they have been facing stiff competition from automakers in the US and Europe, especially from companies like

Tesla. Sales of electric vehicles (EVs), especially battery-operated cars, increased in the US, Europe, China, and around the world last year. Booking of EV cars is happening so fast that companies have even started taking full amounts in advance from the buyers.

The world came to a standstill position following the Covid pandemic, which was impacted further by the Russian action on Ukraine. But humanity faces a greater threat from climate change. Wars and military actions only exacerbate climate change. For example, due to the presence of the Indian Army on the high glaciers of the Himalayas on the Pakistan border, the snow keeps melting, which disturbs the environmental balance in the Himalayan region. The UN panel report on climate change says that the emission of greenhouse gases has increased by 14%. Developed countries have a big role in deteriorat-

ing the situation, whose anti-environmental activities have threatened life on half the earth.

The continuous emission of greenhouse gases puts a question mark on the future of plants, animals, and humans. The existence of all the flora and fauna on earth is dependent on each other. This interdependence is called an ecosystem. The balance of the ecosystem deteriorates due to the increase in the number of greenhouse gases. For example, due to the excessive use of pesticides in agriculture, 75% of the world’s insect moths have been destroyed, which are food for birds. Due to the elimination of insects, birds are not able to get food, due to which their population is rapidly declining. Similarly, the extinction of ponds and natural water bodies is killing the species of small animals like frogs and tortoises among others. The existence of snakes is in danger in the absence of frogs. Losing any one organism

in an ecosystem means that other species that depend on it will die. Due to this imbalance in nature, the life of humans is also in danger.

Since the world is passing through a major crisis; our daily life is also getting affected. For example, cooking oil prices have gone up in the wake of war, but prices are expected to remain stable in the coming days. The production of oilseeds is expected to be good in the country this year, hence the supply of mustard oil and soybean oil is expected to be satisfactory in the approaching months. According to the news being received from the agriculture sector, the production of mustard in the country is expected to increase by 40 lakh tonnes, due to which the supply of mustard oil will increase by 15 lakh tonnes. Soybean production has also improved. India consumes about 18 lakh tonnes of cooking oil every month.

Reserve Bank of India increases repo rate by 50 basis points

Reserve Bank of India's Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) increased the repo rate by 50 basis points to 5.90 on Friday. The RBI Governor Shaktikanta Das, heading the MPC, announced the hike to subdue the inflation. According to him there may be price pressure on wheat, rice and pulses due to lower sown acreage. The vegetable prices may also go up. The inflation is pegged at 6.7%. Das said the gross domestic product (GDP) grew by 13.5% year-on-year (YoY) in the first half. The real GDP is projected at 7%. The economic activity is resilient and investment is picking. The bank credit has increased. The capacity utilization in the manufacturing sector has increased while merchandise exports are facing some headwinds.

RBI governor says world economy in the eye of a new storm and no one is insulated from it

The world is in the eye of a new storm but the domestic economy is resilient, is how governor Shaktikanta Das opened his post-policy presser this afternoon, listing the third shock facing the global economy after the pandemic and Ukraine war. Earlier in the day, the RBI-led monetary policy committee delivered the third straight 50-bps repo rate hike, taking the overall increase in the federal fund rates by 190 bps to 5.90 per cent - the highest since April 2019 and going by all indications, they aren't done yet as inflation remains much above its tolerance level for the eighth month on the trot. Yet, earlier in the day, the MPC-RBI lowered the growth forecast for the second time to 7% down from 7.8% in April and 7.2% in August.

Rate hike by RBI to result in sustainable growth: ASSOCHAM

New Delhi: Describing the 50 basis points increase in the REPO rate a decision on the expected lines, ASSOCHAM said it goes to the credit of the RBI for anchoring the country's monetary policy in a manner that ensures financial stability and maintains optimism about India's inherent strength, braving a world full of financial turmoil, fear of recession and unabated inflationary outlook.

India still remains the world's fastest-growing major economy and the RBI continues to cushion this strong expansion well, despite significant global challenges."

The ASSOCHAM Secretary General Deepak Sood said, "Even as global headwinds persist, India is much better poised than its peers amongst the Emerging Market pack, both in terms of demand pickup as also supply augmentation. Demand improvement and supply augmentation are the twin positives that would ensure a sustainable growth of seven per cent, as spelt out by the RBI Governor Mr Shaktikanta Das. The RBI is using the best of the monetary tools to anchor adequate liquidity while calibrating inflationary pressures". The two measures are visible across agriculture, services and industry, more so ahead of the festive season. The ASSOCHAM said while the increase by 50 bps to 5.90% in the policy rates is bound to see a rise in the borrowing costs for the industry and the

household borrowers, it would be balanced by the easing of inflation over the medium term. There are several external factors at play simultaneously which have to be dealt with by the RBI and the government. "Both RBI and the government are working in perfect coordination to keep the impact of external volatility at the minimum, be it on the foreign exchange rates, fiscal situation or the overall macro-economic stability", the chamber said. The chamber welcomed the RBI decision to introduce a framework for securitisation of stressed assets, beyond the existing route of the Asset Reconstruction Companies (ARCs). "While the banks have managed well to reduce their Gross and Net NPAs, the stress in the system needs several transparent, well-defined measures to deal with the ups and downs of the business cycles.

Rise in home loan interest beyond 9.5% likely to have high impact on housing sales



Demand for 3BHK houses has outstripped that of 2BHKs for the first time, a Consumer Sentiment Survey said that the rise in home loan interest rate beyond the 9.5% mark is likely to have a big impact on housing sales. At least 44% of the respondents preferred 3BHKs, followed by 38% favouring 2BHKs, said the survey conducted by the Industry body CII-Abarock. In the survey's H1 2021 edition, 46% preferred 2BHKs, and 40% voted for 3BHKs. Similarly, the demand for 4BHKs has also risen -- from 2% in the pre-Covid survey to 7% now.

Rupee rises 24 paise to 81.49 against US dollar

Indian rupee appreciated 24 paise to 81.49 against the US dollar in early trade on Friday ahead of the RBI monetary policy decision. Forex traders said the rupee gained as the dollar retreated from its elevated levels. However, the local unit is likely to remain volatile amid the announcement of the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) monetary policy decision.



At the interbank foreign exchange, the domestic unit opened at 81.60 against the dollar, then touched 81.49, registering a gain of 24 paise over its previous close. On Thursday, the rupee recovered from record lows to settle 20 paise higher at 81.73 against the dollar. The RBI will announce its policy rate decision at 1000 hrs on Friday with the market factoring in a 50 basis points rate hike, and a 75 basis points hike would be a surprise as other central banks have done recently, said Anil Kumar Bhansali, Head of Treasury, Finrex Treasury Advisors. Meanwhile, the dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, fell 0.10 per cent to 112.14. Brent crude futures, the global oil benchmark, fell 0.19 per cent to USD 88.32 per barrel. "The dollar index has fallen, the US 10-year yield is at 3.79 per cent while oil is slightly down on the prospect of an output cut, weaker dol-

lar and a recession," Bhansali said. In the domestic equity market, the 30-share BSE Sensex was trading 139.9 points or 0.25 per cent down at 56,270.06 and the broader NSE Nifty fell 32.80 points or 0.2 per cent to 16,785.30. Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) were net sellers in the capital markets as they offloaded shares worth Rs 3,599.42 crore on Thursday, according to exchange data.

Housing sales up 49 per cent in Jul-Sep across 8 major cities: PropTiger

NEW DELHI: Housing sales have risen 49 per cent year-on-year to 83,220 units in the July-September period across eight major cities on pent up demand, despite rise in interest rates and property prices, according to PropTiger.com. Sales stood at 55,910 units in the same quarter last year. The sales have surpassed the pre-pandemic levels of 2019's Q3 (July - September), housing brokerage firm PropTiger.com said on Thursday in its quarterly report Real Insight Residential -- July-September 2022.



«The real estate industry is bouncing back from the pandemic and subsequent disruptions,» said Vikas Wadhawan, Group CFO, PropTiger.com, Housing.com and Makaan.com. Despite the slight increase in overall interest rates, he said the demand for housing has not dipped. He attributed the rise in demand to renewed thrust towards home ownership. As per the data, housing sales in Mumbai jumped over twofold to 28,800 units in the third quarter of this calendar year, from 14,160 units in the corresponding period of the previous year. Pune witnessed 55 per cent growth in sales to 15,700 units from 10,130 units, Delhi NCR saw 22 per cent increase in housing sales to 5,430 units from 4,460 units. Sales in Ahmedabad rose 44 per cent to 7,880 units in July-September 2022, from 5,480 units in the year-ago period.

In Bengaluru, the sales of residential properties increased 20 per cent to 7,890 units from 6,550 units. Housing sales in Hyderabad rose 35 per cent to 10,570 units from 7,810 units. However, PropTiger data showed that sales dropped by 5 per cent each in Chennai and Kolkata. Housing sales in Chennai fell to 4,420 units from 4,670 units. The sales of residential properties in Kolkata declined to 2,530 units in July-September this year, from 2,650 units in the year-ago period.

Increased repo rate big dampener for auto industry: FADA



The hike in key interest rate by RBI is a big dampener for the automobile industry particularly for the price sensitive entry-level two-wheelers and passenger vehicles segments, Federation of Automotive Dealers Associations said on Friday. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) on Friday raised the key interest rate by 50 basis points, the fourth straight increase since May with more hikes expected to rein in inflation. The Monetary Policy Committee (MPC), comprising three members from the RBI and three external experts, raised the key lending rate or the repo rate to 5.90% the highest since April 2019.

Asian stocks sink on German inflation, British tax cuts

BEIJING: Asian stocks sank again on Friday after German inflation spiked higher, British Prime Minister Liz Truss defended a tax-cut plan that rattled investors and Chinese manufacturing weakened. Shanghai, Tokyo, Hong Kong and Sydney retreated. Oil prices edged lower. Wall Street's benchmark S and P 500 index fell 2.1 per cent on Thursday to its lowest level in almost two years after strong US jobs data reinforced expectations the Federal Reserve will stick to plans for more interest rate hikes. Investors increasingly worry the global economy might tip into recession following interest rate hikes by the Fed and central banks in Europe and



Asia to cool inflation that is at multi-decade highs. Global export demand is weakening and Russia's attack on Ukraine has disrupted oil and gas markets. Markets slipped on Thursday after Germany reported September inflation accelerated to 10.9 per cent and Chancellor Olaf Scholz said the world's fourth-biggest economy faces a double whammy as energy prices surge. We'd be inclined to argue that we haven't yet seen the bottom, said ING economists

in a report. The Shanghai Composite Index lost 0.6 per cent to 3,023.91 after surveys of manufacturers showed production and new orders declined in September. The Nikkei 225 in Tokyo fell 1.7 per cent to 25,979.75 and the Hang Seng in Hong Kong declined by 0.2 per cent to 17,126.01. The Kospi in Seoul added 0.2 per cent to 2,173.71. Sydney's S and P ASX 200 sank 0.7 per cent to 6,506.20. New Zealand and Southeast Asian markets declined. Investors already were uneasy about signs global activity was weakening before Truss's government announced multi-billion-dollar tax cuts.

Amit Shah approves release of Rs 488 cr to UP, Punjab, Goa for disaster mitigation

Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Friday approved the release of Rs 488 crore to Uttar Pradesh, Punjab and Goa as central share of the State Disaster Mitigation Fund (SDMF) for 2021-22. Based on the recommendations of the 15th Finance Commission, the central government has allocated Rs 32,031 crore for the SDMF and Rs 13,693 crore for the National Disaster Mitigation Fund (NDMF) for 2021-22 to 2025-26, according to an official release. These mitigation funds are to be used for undertaking mitigation activities, involving



local level and community-based interventions, which will reduce the risks from disasters and promote environment-friendly settlements and livelihood practices. He also discussed India's forthcoming presidency of the G20, the growing prominence of the Quad platform in the Indo-Pacific, and the central importance of US-India Business ties in steady and strengthening bilateral relations, according to a USIBC statement. Additional, key topics of discussion at the lunch included the situation in the Indo-Pacific, geopolitical tensions, and the impact on the global economy, as well as the challenges on climate and energy policy. During the lunch, industry executives expressed optimism regarding India's growth trajectory, and commitment to engage with the government further on these issues, as well as policies for expanding foreign direct investment, the statement said.

A great deal of world's history will be written in Indo-Pacific in coming years: Biden

United States of America is committed to ensuring a free, open, stable and secure Indo-Pacific, President Joe Biden has said, asserting that a great deal of the world's history will be written in the strategically vital region over the coming years.

The president addressed the visiting leaders from a dozen Pacific Island countries in Washington on Thursday in the first-ever summit held to make the Indo-Pacific region safe and keep these island nations away from the increasing influence of China, which in the past few years has made extraordinary outreach efforts in the region.

Today, security in the Pacific and for the Pacific Islanders remains as critical as ever to us and I hope to you as well. The security of America, quite frankly, and the world depends on your security and the security of the Pacific Islands. And I really mean that, Biden said.

He said the purpose behind the summit was also about deepening enduring commitment to each other and a shared future and commitment to tackling the climate crisis, which threatens all.

The summit was attended by heads of state from Fiji, Solomon Island, Micronesia, Papua New Guinea, Tuvalu, Marshall Island, Palau, Samoa, Tonga, Polynesia, New Caledonia and Cook Islands.

We're seeing the consequences of climate change around the world very vividly, including in the United States right now. And I know your nations feel it acutely. For you all, it's an existential threat. It's an existential threat, Biden said.

We are also committed to working together to equitably rebuild the global economy in the wake of COVID-19 and Russia's war, to ensure an Indo-Pacific region that's free and open, one that is stable and



prosperous, and resilient and secure, he said.

A great deal of the history of our world is going to be written in the Indo-Pacific over the coming years and decades, he said, adding that the Pacific Islands are a critical voice in

shaping that future.

That's why my administration has made it a priority to strengthen our partnership with your countries and with the Pacific Islands Forum, he said.

US programmes to improve the lives of Pacific Islanders, which includes more than USD 130 million in new investments to support climate resilience and build sustainable blue economies in the Pacific Islands; prepare for climate impacts on

public health and food security, and to strengthen sustainable development; and also to build a better early warning capacity to predict, prepare for, and respond to climate hazards.

This is going to build on approximately USD 375 million in climate programmes we currently have in the region, he said. President Biden also announced that his administration will also take several important diplomatic steps. I'm proud to announce that, following appropriate consultations, we will recognise the Cook Islands and Niue as sovereign states, he said.

We look forward to successfully concluding negotiations for a Compact of Free Association with three of our closest partners in the region - the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau, he said.

According to the White House, the Summit reflects

America's broadening and deepening cooperation on key issues such as climate change, pandemic and economic recovery, maritime security, environmental protection, and advancing a free and open Indo-Pacific.

The Biden administration believes that the Pacific Islands region an ocean continent spanning nearly 15 per cent of the Earth's surface is a vital sub-region of the Indo-Pacific.

It holds opportunities and challenges, from the climate crisis to an increasingly complex geopolitical landscape.

Suu Kyi convicted again, Australian economist gets 3 years



A court in military-ruled Myanmar convicted former leader Aung San Suu Kyi in another criminal case Thursday and sentenced Australian economist Sean Turnell to three years in prison for violating Myanmar's official secrets act, a legal official said.

Suu Kyi received a three-year sentence after being tried and convicted with Turnell under the secrets law, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because he is not authorized to release information about the case.

Three members of her Cabinet were also found guilty, each receiving sentences of three years.

Turnell, an associate professor in economics at Sydney's Macquarie University, had served as an adviser to Suu Kyi, who was detained in the capital Naypyitaw when her elected government was ousted by the army on Feb. 1, 2021.

He has been in detention for almost 20 months. He was arrested five days after the military takeover by security forces at a hotel in Yangon, the country's biggest city, while waiting for a car to take him to the city's international airport.

He had arrived back in Myanmar from Australia to take up a new position as a special consultant to Suu Kyi less than a month before he was detained. As director of the Myanmar Development Institute, he already had lived in Naypyitaw for several years.

The day after the military's takeover, he posted a message on Twitter that he was: Safe for now but heartbroken for what all this means for the people of Myanmar. The bravest, kindest person I know. They deserve so much better.

He was charged along with Suu Kyi and the three former Cabinet ministers on the basis of documents seized from him. The exact details of their offense have not been made public, though state television said last year that Turnell had access to secret state financial information and had tried to flee the country.

Saka Panja Sahib centenary : Sikh pilgrims to depart Pakistan on October 28

Sikh pilgrims will depart for Pakistan on October 28 from the Attari-Wagah border near Amritsar to take part in the Saka Panja Sahib centenary event at Gurdwara Panja Sahib, said Delhi Sikh Gurdwara Management Committee president Harmeet Singh Kalka on Tuesday.

The pilgrims will return to Amritsar on November 2, he said. They will also visit Lahore and other gurdwaras in Pakistan, including Nankana Sahib.

"Of 240 pilgrims, 40 pilgrims will be sent by the DSGMC from Delhi, Noida, Gurugram, Faridabad and Ghaziabad," Kalka said.

He said the pilgrims must be inoculated with both doses of the Covid-19 vaccine and must undergo a COVID-19 test 72 hours before departing for Pakistan.

UNSC to vote on resolution condemning Russia's referendum in Ukraine

The United Nations Security Council has scheduled a vote for Friday afternoon on a resolution that would condemn Russia for its illegal so-called referendum in four Ukrainian regions and declare that they have no validity.

The US- and Albanian-sponsored resolution would call on all countries not to recognise any alterations to the status of Ukraine's Luhansk, Donetsk, Kherson and Zaporizhzhia regions.

It would reaffirm the UN commitment to Ukraine's sovereignty, territorial integrity and independence within its internationally recognised borders.

PM Modi meets Japanese counterpart Fumio Kishida

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Tuesday met his Japanese counterpart Fumio Kishida here and conveyed his deepest condolences over the sudden demise of former prime minister Shinzo Abe as he underlined the late Japanese leader's contributions in strengthening the bilateral partnership as well as his vision of a free, open and inclusive Indo-Pacific region.

Indian Prime Minister Modi, who is here to attend the state funeral of Abe, met Kishida ahead of the ceremony and the two leaders renewed

UN meeting produces sense that a "new epoch" is arriving



The war in Ukraine and its global fallout transfixed the meeting of world leaders at the UN General Assembly this year. When it wasn't out front, it lurked in the background of virtually every speech.

There were near-unanimous calls for an end to the seven-month war, with rich and poor countries decrying the fallout from the conflict widespread shortages and rising prices not only for food but for energy, inflation hitting the cost of living everywhere, and growing global inequality.

The speeches and side meetings produced no breakthroughs toward peace, but they did put the top diplomats from Russia and Ukraine in the same room for the first time in many months, however briefly.

Blinken and Pak FM Bilawal discuss importance of managing 'responsible' ties with India



The importance of managing a "responsible relationship" with India and addressing the debt issue with China so that Pakistan can recover more quickly from the impact of the devastating floods were the key focus of the talks between US Secretary of State Antony Blinken and his Pakistani counterpart Bilawal Bhutto Zardari.

During the meeting at the Foggy Bottom headquarters of the State Department on Monday, Blinken also said US and Pakistan will continue to work closely on counterterrorism issues. In our discussion today, we talked about the importance of managing a responsible relationship with India, and I also

urged our colleagues to engage China on some of the important issues of debt relief and restructure so that Pakistan can more quickly recover from the floods, Blinken said at an event here to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of US-Pakistan relations.

Relations between India and Pakistan have been strained over the Kashmir issue and cross-border terrorism emanating from Pakistan. The ties between the two countries nosedived after India abrogated Article 370 of the Constitution, revoking the special status of Jammu and Kashmir and bifurcating the State into two Union Territories on August 5, 2019.

Model fearing Myanmar military heads to asylum in Canada

A fashion model from Myanmar who feared being arrested by the country's military government if she was forced back home from exile has arrived in Canada, which she says has granted her asylum. Thaw Nandar Aung, also known as Han Lay, left on a flight from Bangkok's Suvarnabhumi Airport early on Wednesday morning, according to Archayon Kraithong, a deputy commissioner of Thailand's Immigration Bureau.

Thaw Nandar Aung wrote on Facebook she had arrived in Canada and thanked her fans for their support. I will do my best to help my beloved Myanmar and the people of Myanmar as much as I can, she wrote in the post seen on Thursday. Thaw Nandar Aung had told Radio Free Asia, a US-government funded broadcaster, on Tuesday that she was headed to Canada, after having been granted political asylum there with the assistance of the UN refugee agency and the Canadian Embassy in Thailand.



Vatican sanctions Nobel laureate after Timor accusations

The Catholic Church's decades-long sex abuse scandal caught up with a Nobel Peace Prize winner on Thursday, with the Vatican confirming that it had sanctioned the East Timor independence hero, Bishop Carlos Ximenes Belo, following allegations that he sexually abused boys there during the 1990s.

The Vatican admission came a day after a Dutch magazine, De Groene Amsterdammer, exposed the claims against the revered Catholic bishop, citing two of Belo's alleged victims and reporting there were others who hadn't come forward in East Timor, where the church wields enormous influence.

Tense Japan holds funeral for assassinated ex-leader Abe

A tense Japan prepared Tuesday for a rare and controversial state funeral for assassinated former Prime Minister Shinzo Abe, the longest-serving leader in his nation's modern history and one of the most divisive.

Tokyo was under maximum security, with angry protests opposing the funeral planned around the capital and nation. Hours before the ceremony began, dozens of people carrying bouquets of flowers queued at public flower-laying stands at nearby Kudanzaka park.

Thousands of uniformed police mobilized around the



Budokan hall, where the funeral is being held, and at major train stations. Roads around the venue are closed throughout the day, and coin lockers at main stations were sealed for security. World leaders, including US Vice President Kamala Harris, were in town for the funeral.

Opponents of the state-sponsored funeral, which has its roots

in prewar imperial ceremonies, say taxpayers' money should be spent on more meaningful causes, such as addressing widening economic disparities caused by Abe's policies.

Prime Minister Fumio Kishida has been criticised for forcing through the costly event to honour his mentor, Abe, who was assassinated in July. There has also been a widening controversy about Abe's and the governing party's decades-long close ties with the ultra-conservative Unification Church, accused of raking in huge donations by brainwashing adherents.

US expands, extends Myanmar immigration status to May 2024

US President Biden's administration said it is expanding and extending temporary legal status in the US for several thousand people from Myanmar after a military coup last year in the Asian country.

The Monday's decision extends Temporary Protected Status for 18 months for an estimated 970 people of Myanmar until May 25, 2024, and makes an additional 2,290 eligible to live and work until that date if they were in the United States on Sunday.

People of Myanmar are continuing to suffer a complex and deteriorating humanitarian crisis due to a military coup, upheaval, and security forces' brutal violence against civilians", said Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas. Myanmar, also called Burma, has been ruled by the military for most of the past 70 years.

The army's takeover interrupted a gradual transition toward democratic civilian government and a more modern, open economy and resulted in a slew of sanctions against the military, which controls a number of industries as well as army family members and cronies.

About 150,000 immigrants from Myanmar lived in the US in 2019, according to the Migration Policy Institute analysis of census data.

Congress created the Temporary Protected Status programme in 1990 to provide a safe haven for people unable to return to their countries due to natural disasters or civil strife.



World Heart Day : Tobacco major risk factor for heart diseases, strong law must to check fatalities, say experts

Tobacco consumption is a major risk factor for not only cancer but also cardiovascular diseases, experts warned on World Heart Day on Thursday and demanded early passage of the COTPA Amendment Bill to ban point-of-sale advertisements.

The draft Cigarettes and Other Tobacco Products Act Amendment Bill also proposes banning public designated smoking zones to ensure a healthy and fit India. The theme for this year's World Heart Day is "Use Heart for Every Heart."

At a webinar organised by public health platform Tobacco Free India', Dr Uma Kumar, head of the Department of



Rheumatology, AIIMS, highlighted the link between tobacco and cardiovascular diseases.

"Tobacco is the world's leading cause of death, responsible for 44 per cent of all fatalities caused by non-communicable diseases, or 17.9 million deaths annually," she said.

Tobacco use and exposure to second-hand smoke are major causes of cardiovascular diseases, including heart attacks

and stroke, contributing to approximately 3 million deaths per year worldwide, Dr Uma Kumar said.

"If all the political parties reach a consensus on the progressive COTPA amendments at the earliest, we will be saving millions of youth from falling into the trap of harmful tobacco products," she said. Noting that India is the second largest producer and consumer of tobacco that claims nearly 13 lakhs lives annually, BJP MP Manoj Tiwari said the government under Prime Minister Narendra Modi's guidance has adopted a 'zero-tolerance' policy against the hazardous product.

Germany set to enter recession in 2023: Economic forecast

Germany is set to enter a recession in 2023, with a decline in gross domestic product (GDP) of 0.4%, according to a joint forecast published by leading economic institutes in the country.

In the spring, the institutes were still predicting that Europe's largest economy would grow by 3.1%, reports Xinhua news agency.

However, the new forecast "mainly reflects the extent of the energy crisis", according to the forecast published on Thursday by RWI Leibniz Institute for Eco-

conomic Research, the Halle Institute for Economic Research (IWH), the Kiel Institute for the World Economy, and the ifo Institute. A "significant part" of Germany's gas supply has been lost since the start of the Russia-Ukraine war, increasing the risk that "remaining supply and storage volumes will not be sufficient to meet demand during the coming winter".

Gas prices in Europe have tripled, since Russian supplies to Germany via the Nord Stream 1 pipeline have been repeatedly reduced, and finally stopped altogether.

Abuse of this mercurial element. Archaeologists have been finding mercury at archaeological sites in Mexico and Central America for more than a century.

The most common form reported is cinnabar (mercury sulfide, or HgS), a bright red mineral used extensively by the ancient Maya for decoration, craft, and ritual purposes such as burials and in tombs.

Cuba in the dark after hurricane knocks out power grid



Cuba remained in the dark early on Wednesday after Hurricane Ian knocked out its power grid and devastated some of the country's most important tobacco farms when it hit the island's western tip as a major storm.

Authorities were working overnight to gradually restore service to the country's 11 million people, according to a statement from Cuba's Electric Union. Power was initially knocked out to about 1 million people in Cuba's western provinces, but later the entire grid collapsed. Ian hit a Cuba that has been struggling with an economic crisis and has faced frequent power outages in recent months.

It made landfall as a Category 3 storm on the island's western end, devastating Pinar del Ro province, where much of the tobacco used for Cuba's iconic cigars is grown. Tens of thousands of people were evacuated and others fled the area ahead of the arrival of Ian, which caused flooding, damaged houses and toppled trees.

Heavy mercury contamination at Maya sites reveals a deep historic legacy

Mercury is a toxic heavy metal. When leached into the natural environment, it accumulates and builds up through food chains, ultimately threatening human health and ecosystems.

In the last century, human activities have increased atmospheric mercury concentrations by 300-500 per cent above natural levels.

However, in some parts of

the world, humans have been modifying the mercury cycle for thousands of years. This anthropogenic (human-caused) mercury use has led to mercury entering places globally it wouldn't otherwise be found, such as in lakes or soils in remote locations.

One region with an especially long (but poorly documented) history of mercury use is Mexico and Central America. Early Me-



soamerican societies such as the Olmec had been mining and using mercury in southern Mexico as early as 2000 BCE.

In our research, published in Frontiers in Environmental Science, we review the ways the Maya used mercury, the mystery of how they sourced it, and the environmental legacy of past mercury use.

Our present mercury problem has a deep legacy. Understanding its origins will also help us understand the trajectory of humanity's fascination with, use of and



In sacred Brazil dunes, critics see evangelical encroachment

The vast blanket of white sand overlooking Salvador is a place to escape rumbling traffic, ping-pong phones and crying children. A space to find solitude and, increasingly, God.

Evangelicals have been converging on the massive Abaete dune system for some 25 years but especially lately, with thousands now coming each week to sing, pray and enter transele states. Some scrawl prayers on scraps of paper to be burned.

I never tire of coming up here and glorifying, said Deja Soares, 47, adding that she has seen the paralysed walk and the blind see. The things God does here are incredible. This year the dunes have become a flashpoint after City Hall began building a plaza and welcome center at one spot along

their base, with a staircase up the sand soon to follow.

A future phase would entail a platform atop the plateau. Defenders of the project say it's necessary to protect the fragile dunes from the increasingly heavy foot traffic. But it has come under fire from Afro-Brazilian religious groups, who have been performing their own rituals in the dunes for generations, and protest what they see as elected officials abusing their power to coopt and Christianize yet another public space.

"When we go there (Australia) we will see how the conditions are. I'm looking forward

to doing well."

Arshdeep (3/32) and Deepak Chahar (2/24) broke South Africa's backbone to help India register an easy eight-wicket win over the Proteas in the low-scoring first T20I of the three-match series here on Wednesday night.

"We are trying to tick all the boxes in the practice sessions and trying to execute all our plans on the field. Today (Wednesday) was really a good example of showing a good power play bowling and we are looking forward to do amazing things in the coming days," Arshdeep said at the post-match presentation.

The left-arm pacer, a key arsenal in India's death bowling scheme of things for the

ICC showpiece next month, missed the preceding three T20Is against Australia after he was sent to the NCA for conditioning.

"The purpose of the last 10 days was to get refreshed and come back stronger and fitter that will help me in my bowling. I feel really refreshed and looking forward to doing good things on the field," Arshdeep said after his exploits with the ball.

Bowling with the new ball in the absence of Jasprit Bumrah and Bhuvneshwar Kumar, Arshdeep came back with a bang, grabbing three wickets in five balls to reduce South Africa to 8 for 4 in the second over.

The visitors never recovered from Arshdeep's early blows to lose the opening match of the series, which is the last leg of preparation for both the teams before heading to Australia.

In the preceding T20 series against Australia, India had defeated the reigning world champions 2-1 after losing the first match.

Arshdeep Singh, who made his debut in the tour of England in July this year, said he always strives to give his best on the field without bothering about selection.
